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Adventists Temperance Day

Saturday, Feb. 26 has been designated "Temperance Day" at the Sandy Seventh-Day Adventist Church, Pastor George W. Chambers has announced that his subject at the morning service will be "Slow Suicide".

Pastor Chambers said, "Tobacco is a slow, insidious poison, and its effects are more difficult to cleanse from the system than those of liquor." He noted that science has "thoroughly indicted tobacco as a major cause of lung cancer, heart disease, emphysema, and other maladies, with almost every public health association being on record regarding the dangers of tobacco use."

Chambers said that Adventists have historically abstained from both alcohol and tobacco, and he stated, "Other Seventh-day Adventist churches throughout the nation will also renew their abstinence pledges this Sabbath, and will be pro-

viding how-to-stop smoking literature to any one who may desire it." He invited those who would like factual, how to quit material to write or call Francis Meeker, Rt. 1, Box 20, Mu 7 4932, the temperance secretary of the church.

He noted that one of the tragedies of this problem is that 4,500 boys and girls between the ages of 12 and 17 light up cigarettes for the first time every day of the year, thus beginning an addiction to a killing habit.

Elderly Must Apply Now For Medicare

The voluntary medical insurance program, known as "Medicare" under the new social security amendments of 1965 will be available to persons over 65 years of age, providing they enroll in the program by March 31, 1966.

The Office of Economic Opportunity and Social Security administration have combined forces to give information on the matter, according to a letter to the Post from Harrison A. Williams, U. S. Senator from New Jersey, and chairman of the sub-committee on migratory labor.

Senator Williams said if an individual does not enroll by March 31, 1966, he will not be eligible to qualify for voluntary medical insurance until the next general enrollment in October, 1967.

The New Jersey senator pointed out that to date several million elderly have not filed applications for the program. He said that among these are many farm - workers due to their lack of education or communication have no knowledge of the programs. "Ironically, these are the people who need these benefits the most," the senator declared.

Columbia View Trips Sandy 22-19

Columbia View cashed in on a pair of free throws each by Dave Robertson and Larry Ostrom to slip past highly rated Sandy 22-19, in a wild and woolly Eastern Multnomah county league clash for the blue chips Friday. Columbia View by dropping the stubborn Mountaineers clinched at least a tie for the conference crown.

All in all the Colts collected 8 of 10 bonus tosses in the second half and 12 of 18 overall.

Sandy actually scored two more field goals but lost out at the charity line.

The lead then changed hands twice before Robertson dropped in two free throws at 1:55 to give the Colts an 18-17 advantage.

This set the stage for Robertson's and Ostrom's aforementioned free throws to put the game on ice.

Robertson set the scoring pace for the Colts bucketing 11. Williams consorted the losers with 9 points.

The Colts shot a .235 clip from the field while the Mountaineers were at .212. Sandy outscored their foes, 29-17.

It's been an impressive season for Coach Stavros's defending champion Mountaineers mowing down every rival but Columbia View and taking them on head to head only to lose in the last moments.

Vine Maple Bridge Ready, Road Improvement Planned

The Vine Maple Bridge across the Zig Zag River has been completed into the summer home area according to a report from District Ranger Peter Wingle. The original bridge was destroyed by the flood a year ago, along with the road approaches. The new bridge is made from pressure treated glue laminated wood stringers and concrete abutments. It has been replaced in a new location, about 200 feet downstream from the original crossing. Summer home residents will find that the bridge blends well in its summer home surroundings. Asidewalk provides for the safety of hikers, and there is ample turnout space for vehicles to pass each other at the ends of the single lane bridge.

Although the road to the bridge from the state highway at Rhododendron has been reconstructed and surfaced with crushed rock, the remainder of the Vine Maple Road is still in its original condition. The new section will be oiled next spring in order to minimize the dust problem, and to keep the road in the best possible condition. Several summer home owners have complained about the holes in the Vine Maple and other roads in the summer home area. Since there is competition for existing funds, the Forest Service must allocate balanced portions of road construction appropriations to other recreation, timber access, and land use roads. For the present time, neither the Still Creek Road nor the Vine Maple Road will be reconstructed, but they will be maintained in passable condition.

The heavy winter use of the summer home roads has created some unusual new problems. More and more homes are purchased by folks wishing to live in them all year long and by

skiers planning winter use. As a result the roads, which were originally constructed for summer use only, are now being used all winter long. Most are narrow single lane roads, constructed without culverts, surfacing or adequate width. Plowing these roads without subsequent damage from running water or "chuck-holing" is impossible and the roads show the problems. The Forest Service will repair the holes in most of the roads after the snow melts, with additional crushed rock and grading. Many summer home owners have already indicated that they do not want the charm of the area changed by major road widening or reconstruction.

Ranger Wingle will be interested to hear what the residents in the summer home areas think about road improvement and winter use. The roads were originally constructed for the exclusive use of the permittees, who were responsible for the road maintenance. Since many other people now use the road, the Forest Service has assumed the maintenance responsibility for this additional use. Whatever is done will necessarily impose additional financial burden upon the road users, since the Forest Service can only be able to finance a portion of the increased construction and maintenance costs.
