FARM BUREAU FURROW

If Congress goes along with the President, agricultural research appropriations will be cut by about 14% for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1966. The one-year cut in Oregon alone will be in excess of \$220,000.

The plan of the Administration is to redirect the funds into Great Society programs dealing with rural resource development and work with low income families. If Oregon is to receive any of these monies, projects will have to be submitted to Washington which meet the caprices of the Washington reviewers.

It is ironic that at a time when the Administration is proclaiming a policy to meet the rising food shortages abroad, that the President would propose to cut expenditures in one of the most vital areas which contribute to the abundance of food and fibre we enjoy in this country.

The economic impact to Oregon from the reduction in federally-sponsored research cannot be precisely measured. It could be considerable. It will mean a curtailment, and in some instances a complete elimination, of personnel and programs.

Affected by the reduction would be such programs as the wheat-breeding and disease research program carried on at Pendleton; soil management and

irrigation work going at Ontario; and disease control in deciduous trees. But perhaps of even greater significance than the economic loss is the change in direction of our agricultural research programs. In the past the land grant institutions such as Oregon State have been pretty much free to develop their own research programs. In this manner they have been able to direct their resources toward the area of greatest need. Administrators will no longer enjoy this freedom but will find research largely directed from Washington.

Farm Bureau, at both state and national levels, has made every effort to strengthen agricultural research. The Oregon Farm Bureau federation has actively supported the appropriations necessary at the state level to enable Oregon to carry its part of the cooperative federal-state research program. We vigorously oppose the cutbacks in agricultural research appropriations made by the Administration.

If the United States is serious about combatting world hunger, more, not fewer, funds should be directed toward research.

OSU Launches Work on Air Pollution Checks

Engineers at Oregon State university are renewing studies aimed at improving control of air pollution caused by Oregon's lumber mills with a new grant from the U. S. public health service.

The new studies will provide measurements to be used with current Oregon air pollution statutes. The research will be carried out by Richard W. Boubel, OSU mechanical engineer, assisted by graduate student Kenneth R. Wise. They will receive cooperative assistance from mill owners throughout the state.

Under the three-year, \$15,000 grant, Boubel and Wise will develop techniques for measuring the amounts and kinds of emissions from teepee burners. This type burner is used throughout the Northwest to burn wood wastes from mills.

Measurements provided by the research will then be applied to a statewide study of emissions from different types of burners, different mill procedures and different woods.

Eventually, Boubel projected, the study will result in suggestions to mill owners about ways to reduce pollution caused by their mills.

Boubel suggested that the air pollution problem created by teepee mill burners, although once restricted to the lumber regions of the West coast, is now a national concern.

Teepee burners have proved the most economical method of burning wood wastes, and are being increasingly used for waste burning in the Midwest and eastern U. S., he pointed out.

Air pollution regulations have been in force in Oregon since the early 1950's. As a result of studies by Boubel in 1964, regulations specifically governing the operation of teepee burners were created in cooperation with the lumber industries and the Oregon Sanitary Authority.

TASTY TIDBIT

For delectable pinwheel sandwiches, use this novel way with dried beef; shred finely 1 jar (5 ounces) dried beef. Add 1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese softened with 1/2 cup of half and half cream and 1 tablespoon mayonnaise. Fold in 1/3 cup finely chopped chutney. Spread filling on slices of white bread which have been rolled thin with a rolling pin. Roll as for jelly roll, chill thoroughly.

What's Cooking?

Chewy Cherry Brownies

3 squares (1 oz. each) Unsweetened Chocolate
1/2 cup shortening
3 eggs
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 cup sifted enriched flour*
1 can (3 1/2 oz.) flaked coconut
18 candied cherries, cut in half

In top of double boiler melt together chocolate and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Grease 9 x 13 inch pan. Pre-heat oven to 375. In mixing bowl beat together eggs and salt until thick. Gradually add sugar, beating until light. Blend in cooled chocolate mixture and vanilla. Stir in flour and beat well. Fold in coconut. Turn into pan spreading evenly. Press cherry halves into batter, cut side down, about one inch apart. Bake 30 to 35 minutes, or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan on wire rack. When cool, cut into 36 bars. Store in loosely covered container.

Note: If self rising flour is used, omit salt.

ENGLISH TOFFEE BARS OR SQUARES

1 cup butter or margarine
1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
1 egg
2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 lb. semi sweet chocolate (or small pk. of bits)
1/2 to 1 cup chopped toasted almonds, walnuts, pecans or filberts

Cream the butter. Add the brown sugar and cream together until light and fluffy. Add the egg and beat until the mixture is light.

Sift the flour, baking powder and salt and add to the sugar mixture. Stir in the vanilla and blend well. Spread batter evenly in a greased 10 x 15 inch baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Remove from oven.

While the batter is baking, melt the chocolate over hot water. Before cookies cool

spread the chocolate over the top. Sprinkle with the chopped nuts. Cut into squares or bars while still warm. Makes about 36, 1-1/2 x 3 inch bars.

If using chocolate bits, they may be sprinkled over the cookies when taken from the oven. In a few minutes the bits will be soft enough to spread.

OEO Offers Work Beautifying Roads

Floyd H. Waggoner, Rt. 2, Box 146-A, Forest Grove, is the first worker-trainee to be hired by Green Thumb, Inc. in its program to beautify the roadsides.

"I can sure use the extra dollars as well as the exercise," exclaimed Mr. Waggoner as he donned his safety jacket and helmet. Mr. Waggoner is one of the many older, retired farmers who will be equipped with safety gear, rakes, hoes, and shovels to participate in this program.

This project is funded by the office of economic opportunity for the benefit of the rural poor; and it will offer gainful, parttime employment to needy retired farmers. Worker-trainees will be hired at \$1.50 per hour for three days a week to plant trees, shrubs, and flowers along the highways. Currently this program extends only to Washington, Clackamas, Hood River, and Linn Counties; but there is a good possibility that Marion and Lane Counties will be added at a later date. Persons interested in this employment should contact their local Employment Service Office.
