Column Comments

from the COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE

Romance, a farm girl, a progressive mind and hard work have brought a proud first to Clackamas County.

Robert (Bob) May, Rt. 2, Box 87, Canby, is Oregon's Young Farmer of the Year as selected by the State Junior Chamber of Commerce. Mr. and Mrs. May will leave April 3 for Birmingham, Ala., representing Oregon's agriculture at the national convention of the Jay-see.

Beginning soon after marriage, on an 88 acre farm formerly owned by Mrs. May's parents, the Mays now are farming 234 irrigated acres, including some leased land. Diversity, the adoption of new methods and good management are notable in the May operation. It is also a team operation as Mrs. May is as interested in and conversant with the wide array of enterprises and practices as Mr. May.

Modern type housing is provided for five families for year - round work and for five families on a seasonal basis. They in effect operate a farm motel and the accommodations are comparable to many motels. These families do not furnish all the help at peak season as about 100 workers are needed at times. This is understandable when the extent and number of enterprises are listed.

Intensified farming is exemplified by the operation of the Mays. From conversation with this couple the impression is gained that more intensified cropping and some new crops will be introduced.

The list of crops grown on the May's farm reads like a

catalogue. Last season 20 acres of strawberries, 16 acres of boysenberries, 5 acres of Marion blackberries, 8 acres of evergreen blackberries, 10 acres of broccoli, and 10 acres of cauliflower were grown. Four cuttings of alfalfa were harvested from 15 acres.

Vegetable seeds are also produced. Grown last season were 10 acres of cabbage seed and five acres each of cucumber and squash seed. The Mays have 40 head of beef cattle on irrigated pasture.

The gradual improvement of the land by tile drainage, fertilizing and rotation is a separate story of conservation. Soil fumigation for some crops is practiced as is the judicious use of the modern methods of insect and disease control.

The Mays are looking ahead. They say that more intensified crops and a series of crops that grow the year around are needed. These would better utilize labor, equipment and land.

The Mays deserve the congratulations of all who live in Oregon and especially those in Clackamas County. The Junior Chamber of Commerce, local, state and national, by the Junior Farmer contest is doing what needs doing. It is focusing attention on the largest industry in the U. S.; it reminds all why Americans eat so well and better than any people on earth.
