Henderson Files For House Seat

J. P. (Jim) Henderson has filed for Republican state representative, position No. 2, from Clackamas County. Henderson, 40, is educational television consultant for Pacific Northwest Bell Telephone Co. Jim, with his wife Beverly and their two children live next door to the Jr. High School in Uplands District in Lake Oswego area.

Henderson is a World War II Veteran. He attended Oregon State University. His youth was spent on an Oregon farm.

A long-active, civic-minded Republican worker -- a concerned taxpayer -- an ardent sportsman -- a supporter of expanded educational improvements -- and aid for senior citizens prompted him to seek this responsible position. I imagine many of the Sandy people remember the group; a deer struggling for life with a vicious cougar clinging to its throat.

In the Thomas scrap book there are several reproductions of some of his animal pen and ink sketches, as he had great art ability. Very clever with scissors, he often cut tiny perfect animals from paper with amazing accuracy. His skill as a pianist was another of his talents and he could have performed creditably on the concert stage. In fact, Mr. Aschoff was so wonderfully clever that like the folks in the poem, "The Deserted Village" when they viewed the school teacher.

"And still they gazed and still the wonder grew
That one small head could
Carry all he knew."

Mr. Aschoff was a native of Prussia, coming to this country as a young man living for a while in Kansas, not liking it there he came west with his family and settled in Marmot.

For many years, he was postmaster and store keeper which was such a help to the Marmot people. He built a large hotel which was a favorite recreation spot for many well known Portland residents. Accommodations were furnished not only in the hotel but also in cabins and tents. Aschoff was a genial but without the help of his very hard working wife and his large family the hotel couldn't have operated. Otto Aschoff drove the stage that met the interurban which used to come in at Bull Run. The girls cooked, washed and did the many tasks that are necessary around an establishment of that sort. Carl
