

State Tax Men Offer Filing Aid

Assistance in preparing Oregon state income tax returns will be given by State Tax Commission personnel at the Commission's Oregon City office, 209 Seventh Street, on April 11, 12 and 13 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Taxpayers wishing help in filing their returns are asked to bring earnings slips and other information needed to determine the correct tax, including, if possible, a copy of their federal return filed for the year 1965.

The Tax Commission points out that in order to be eligible for a refund a taxpayer must file a return. Refunds are issued on a "first come, first served" basis.

It is also emphasized that if a joint return is filed, both spouses must sign it. Deadline for filing is April 15.

State Highway Toll Down In March

A continued decrease in the Oregon highway traffic death toll was noted for the month of March, according to the Department of Motor Vehicles. Traffic deaths for March numbered 35, compared to the 48 deaths recorded for the same month last year.

The 107 highway deaths for 1966 is less than at the end of March, 1965, the Department also noted, when 129 deaths were recorded.

Of the 35 traffic fatalities that occurred in March, rural accidents accounted for 80 percent of the deaths. The Department also said that 51 percent of the accident victims were under 31 years of age.

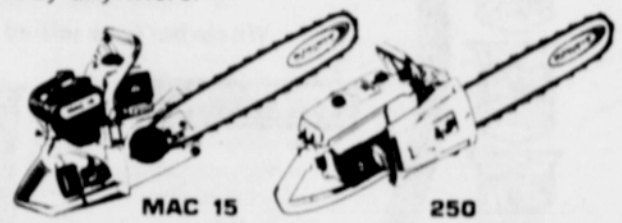
