During his eight weeks of intensified training under veteran noncommissioned officer Drill Instructors, he learned small arms marksmanship, bayonet fighting, and methods of self-protection. He also received instruction in military drill.

Army Pvt. Steven C. Schmale, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alvin D. Schmale, Rt. 3, Box 654, Boring, completed advanced artillery training under the reserve enlistment program at the Army artillery and missile school April 11, at Fort Sill, Okla. Schmale was trained as a cannoneer in field artillery. His training included maintenance and firing of artillery guns, howitzers and heavy machine-guns. Instruction was also given in ammunition handling and communications.

The 19-year-old soldier will return to his Army national guard unit at the completion of his six months tour of active duty.

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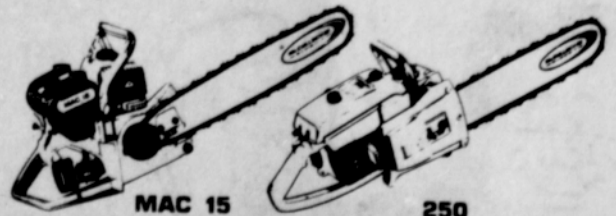
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
