A lovely day, a lovely setting, a lovely wedding, a lovely bride and a handsome groom—All this happened last Saturday, April 2, at "The Chapel of the Hills" when Susan Wilcox, a fairy like bride married Ronald Littlepage.

The bride's attendants, including little sister, Joanie, were demure and sweet in their blue satin gowns with lace tops. Of course the grooms attendants were stalwart and properly grave in their white jackets, Susan in her floating white looked exactly like the candy brides on wedding cakes. She was so beautiful that she didn't seem real. The groom was properly impressed and awed by his supreme good fortune, while Susan beamed happiness in gaining such a splendid husband. Everything was perfect and the reception after the wedding, at the Welches County Club, equally so.

My thoughts went back, back to my wedding. It happened in 1918 at the "church on the Hill" in Cherryville. We were to be married at 8 p.m. and the next day start on a three week camping trip to M. Jefferson. The two saddle horses and two pack horses were supposed to arrive in the afternoon of the wedding day, but the man, a jovial, enterprising gent, who was bringing them, thought it would be fun to put a pack on one of the saddle horses, Winnie Lou, well, Winnie Lou was a lady and she didn't take kindly to such indignities, so with might and main she bucked the pack off and scattered the contents to the four winds. Naturally that delayed matters, and one trouble led to another with the result that our horses didn't arrive until ten o'clock while the guests sat in the hard pews wondering what held up the wedding. No doubt they speculated whether one of the parties had had a change of heart.

Finally all set and George and I marched up the aisle to the tune of "Here Comes the Bride" played by my dear mother on the wheezy old organ. Mr. Wirtz of Sandy, who was Justice of the Peace, performed the ceremony. Evidently he hadn't learned the ritual and as the lighting was inadequate, the horse wrangler had to hold a lamp by his shoulder so he could read the sacred words. But anyway under a rather wobbly arch trimmed with spirea, the knot was safely tied. Afterwards there was a reception at my parents' home in Cherryville.

I still have my white satin wedding dress put carefully away in my cedar chest. It was beautifully made and hand embroidered and cost just \$6.00 for the making. No one said I looked nice, I think I was exhausted from all the turmoil, but George had a lot of comments on how nice he looked. His suit ended up in a small pair of pants for George Jr.

We had a grand camping trip, only marred by frequent showers and arrived home in time for me to start teaching and George to enter the army. Next art class, April 20th.

## Grade School Track Squad Sets Mark

The Sandy grade school track and field team coached by George Stavros set five new school records and tied one while running against Parkrose Junior high schools 7th and 8th grades. The three-way track and field meet was held at Fremont Junior High April 13. Three of the new records were set by Brent Peterson, an 8th grader; 10.9 in the 100 yd. dash; 25.5 in the 220 yd. dash; and 17' 8" in the long jump. Jim Martin also an 8th grader set a new record in the 60-yard high hurdles with a time of 9.4 seconds. Vern Fox, a 7th grader, also set a new record in the 60 yd. low hurdles with a time of 9.3 seconds. Roger Williams and Randy Huserik both 8th graders tied the high jump record of 4 feet 11 inches.
