



Sandy Women To Bowl At New Orleans

A six-member team of women bowlers will represent Sandy in the WIBC bowling tournament in New Orleans, La., Saturday, April 30, and Sunday, May 1.

The bowling team includes Mrs. Jo Lewis, Mrs. Kay Metzger, Mrs. Carolyn Duff, Mrs. Fern Hunter, Mrs. Betty Hartman, captain, and Mrs. Lee Longstreet, who will bowl with another team, and double with Mrs. Hartman.

A year-long fund drive was started by members of the Mt. Hood Women's bowling club and raised a total of \$1122 for the team to make the trip. The bowlers will join 39 other teams from the states of Oregon, Washington and California on two chartered planes bound for New Orleans.

The team will compete for \$1500, \$800 in the doubles events, and \$600 in the singles. Saturday evening, the Sandy women will present a Steelhead fish to Mayor Victor Schiro, of New Orleans. A salmon will be given the governor of the state by the Astoria team. The women bowlers will return to Oregon by chartered plane early Tuesday, May 3.

Rabies Clinic Set for Area

A rabies clinic sponsored by various cooperating agencies, including the Sandy Rural fire protection department, is scheduled for May 4 at the Sandy fire station between the hours of 4 and 8 p.m.

Three years have passed since the last mass rabies clinic was held in Portland and the Tri-county areas of Clackamas, Washington and Multnomah. Dogs and cats which have not been immunized against rabies since that time will have lost their immunity.

Veterinarians of the region are donating their services in mass clinics to be held May 4 through 7 in an effort to protect this area's large population against rabies.

The veterinarians ask that no skunks be brought this year . . . just cats and dogs which are five months of age or older.

P. T. A. fire department and Jaycee organizations are co-operating with the county and state health departments in co-ordination and operation of the clinics.

City Studies Zoning Rules

A public hearing is scheduled Wednesday, May 4, at the Sandy grade school to consider a proposed zoning ordinance for the city of Sandy.

The ordinance will apply to all properties within the city limits and would include the creation of zoning districts for residential, commercial and industrial uses; establish density provisions within each district; provide for off-street parking requirements; non-conforming uses and establish procedures for obtaining conditional use, variances and amendments to the ordinance; and providing for appeals, establishing responsibility for enforcement and stipulating penalties for infractions.

The hearing has been scheduled by order of the common council of the city of Sandy, according to Mrs. Ruth Loundree, city recorder.

Fire-Fighting Methods Displayed to Lions

After the monthly steak dinner feed at the Mt. Hood Lions Club at Wemme last night, District Ranger Pete Wingle demonstrated how the Forest Service organizes and fights large forest fires.

A realistic fire situation was simulated on a wall size screen, putting the Lions in a ring side seat. The entire process of fire organization, beginning with early detection by aircraft, and following through the control period, was shown.

The procedures used to esti-

mate the size of the job, based upon weather and burning conditions, were demonstrated. The estimation of probabilities, development of organization, acquisition and control of men and machines, development of the attack, and discussion of costs and policies were included in the fire program.

Since fire fighting is a procedure involving scientific methods, judgement, human relations, logistics, organization and management, fiscal controls, and work, training is one of the keys to successful resource protection. This same simulator, developed by Pete Wingle, is used to train Forest Service personnel in all phases of wildfire fighting and logging slash disposal.

Training involves not only the line firefighters, but the planning, service, and command functions as well. Skills and confidence can be developed, knowledge and ability tested, and the team approach perfected so the fire organization can be effective when a real disaster occurs. In addition to training programs involving Zigzag Ranger District personnel, the Mt. Hood National Forest will be using the simulator at its fire overhead training session at Welches Golf Course May 23 and 24.

A side benefit to the program was that an already fire conscious Lions Club has become more impressed with the importance of a good fire prevention program.
