Seventeen dealers in the popular vacation vehicles, many of them showing more than one line, will have more than 100 different trailers on view -- from ultra compact models designed for a cozy couple to 35 footers almost as big as mobile homes.

Some 40 mobile homes will be shown by 15 mobile home dealers. They range up to three bedroom models 24 feet wide and 60 feet long. To get ready for the show the dealers have had decorators and interior designers, some of them sent from factory staffs, putting finishing touches on the furnishings of the completely equipped living coaches.

Rosemary Clooney, long popular singing star, headlines a 45-minute stage show to be presented at seven evening and matinee performances during the four day show through Sunday, May 1.
