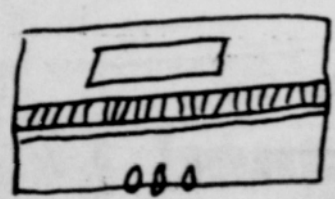

★ Clackamas County Commissioner Reports

The general topic of conversation and of vital concern about the Clackamas County Courthouse presently appears to be the County Budget Committee, which is now in session.

The Clackamas County Budget Committee is established in accordance with Oregon law. The committee is composed of the Board of County Commissioners and three lay members who are appointed by the Board of Commissioners. The lay members are appointed for terms of three years, which terms are so arranged that the term of one member shall expire each year.

The members then choose from their number a chairman and secretary as required by law. This establishes a five member board with the chairman voting only in cases of a tie vote.

Special provisions are carried in the Oregon Revised Statutes that govern the time, manner and purpose of the Budget Committee session. Clackamas county business is carried out on a fiscal year basis beginning July 1st and ending June 30th of the following year.

The general purpose of budgeting, which is the main purpose of the County Budget Committee, is to provide an outline of the programs and fiscal policy for the ensuing year for the county. This is done by providing an estimation of revenues and expenditures that will result from tax levies and will thus provide control of revenues and expenditures of public county funds.

Upon proper notice by publication in a newspaper of general circulation within the county, not less than eight days before the public budget message is delivered, the chairman of the Board of Commissioners sets forth the general aspects for the requirements of funds as necessary to properly carry out the obligations and render services of the various departments of county government.
