

Tax Commission Lists Two Budget Objections

Fresh from a resounding win in its budget election, Mt. Hood Community College now has recommendations from the Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission to consider before officially adopting the budget.

The Tax Commission released a letter last Friday in which it listed two objections to the budget:

1. \$60,000 requirement in the contingency account of the general fund as a transfer to the special revenue fund for library is not "in accordance with the intent of the local budget law and with regulations of the state tax commission."

2. The Commission further objected to a \$95,700 item for indebtedness in the special revenue fund.

If the Commission recommendations were followed, the tax levy could be reduced by some \$35,700 according to the letter.

Dr. Earl Klapstein, college president, said the board would study the recommendations in detail and probably would take some action in June. The budget

does not become effective until July 1.

Meanwhile, the \$496,376 budget passed by a 1803-711 margin last Thursday, gaining approval in every single voting precinct.

Students Receive Awards from FFA

Eight high school students and 2 local men received recognition at the Annual Future Farmers of America Parent and Son Banquet held last Saturday night, April 23, in the high school cafeteria.

Following dinner, Gary Moore, President of the Sandy F.F.A., conducted a chapter meeting, beginning with the F.F.A. opening ritual, the same procedure followed at all State and National FFA meetings. Last fall, Sandy's chapter won first place for Ritual in competition with other chapters in the Columbia River District. Musical entertainment was provided by Sandy High's quartet "The Buckshots".

Green Hands Steve Moore, John Erickson, Eugene Marschman, Robert Irluke and Robert Ludi recited the F.F.A. Creed. Slides taken at this year's National F.F.A. Convention, attended by Tom Karlen, Gary Moore and Allen Marschman, were narrated by Tom Karlen. Craig Rogers reported on the State F.F.A. Convention which he and Gary Moore attended in Bend. At this convention, Gary Moore was awarded the State Farmer degree, the first time Sandy has won this honor in eight years.

Highlight of the meeting came when the awards were presented to local F.F.A. members who had met national FFA standards. In place of the national Foundation award medals, the Sandy chapter awarded plaques. Award winners were: Star Chapter Farmer - Tom Karlen. This award is given to the most outstanding project in addition to being a scholastic leader in chapter affairs. Tom's project consisted of 10 purebred Guernsey animals and the managerial responsibilities of a 40 acre farm. He participated in State and County fairs, attended the National F.F.A. Convention, and maintained a 3.25 gpa.

Star Green Hand - Steve Moore. This award is given to an outstanding first year vocational agriculture student. Steve's project consists of 2 Hereford cows, 4 head of young stock and near full managerial responsibility of his father's small home farm. He plans to increase his project to 15 to 20 head by the time he is a senior.

Crop Proficiency Award - Gary Schmale. Gary has a diversified farming program. His project contains 11 acres of alfalfa (producing 5 ton per acre) and 4 acres of raspberries (producing 3 ton per acre). Dairy Proficiency Award - Gary Moore. Gary became a member of F.F.A. in his fresh-

man year, when his project consisted of 6 registered Holstein cows. Now, four years later, he has increased his herd to a total of 17 registered Holstein dairy animals. With this herd, Gary won the honor of Champion Dairy Showman at the State Fair, and recently received the State Farmer degree given at Bend, in addition to numerous ribbons received at the State and county fairs.

Forestry Proficiency Award - Bill Hite. Bill's project consists of 3 acres of a variety of evergreens, such as noble fir, Colorado blue spruce and ingram fir. Bill is a sophomore, and expects to expand this project by his senior year.

Farm Mechanics Proficiency Award - Allen Marschman. Allen has built nearly everything that ever will be needed on the home farm, and is partially responsible for the 1st and 8th place finish in the Bankers Award at the State Fair in the two years that Sandy has entered. Among his projects have been: utility trailer, land roller, tractor bumpers, overhead hoist, tractor ramp, picnic table, and other such items.

Soil and Water Management Award - Dave Bernhardt. This award was given to Dave for his work with primrose plants. He and his father take care of 42,000 primrose plants. He also helped make a farm pond and waterway.

Livestock Proficiency Award - John Burrell. John's project consisted of 3 registered Angus heifers when he entered vocational agriculture. Now, as a junior, John has increased his project to a total of 7 head of beef cattle. He also plays a

big part in running his father's farm. John also plans to increase his project. The Sandy F.F.A. has 42 members. Its present officers are: Gary Moore - President; Doug Cassidy - Vice President; Tom Karlen

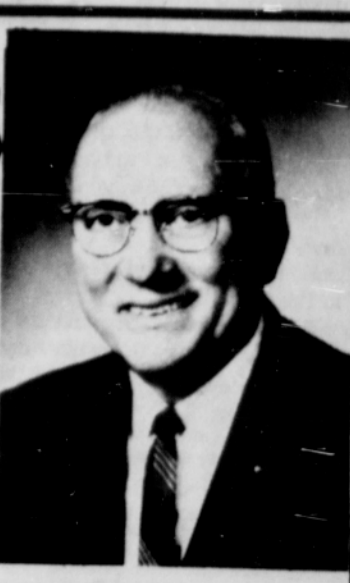

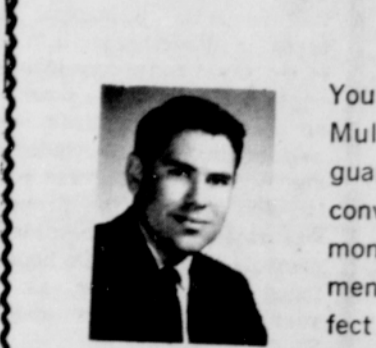
