Alumnae Day is always a happy time for old "grads" and three of us, April 30, joyfully returned to our old "Alma Mater", Oregon Educational College at Monmouth.

It was not only a day for gatherings of graduates of bygone years, but there was a special event which was much anticipated. A splendid new men's dormitory, named for a former much beloved teacher, J. B. V. Butler was dedicated. Three generations of the family were present to take part in the ceremonies - A portrait of "Daddy" Butler as he was affectionately called by his students was presented and after the unveiling, the picture was hung in the lower lounge of the new dormitory. The family was presented with a book of letters, which were written by alumnae and other persons who worked with and were taught by this exceedingly kind and genial man. His home, a large one, was on a knoll west of town and the whole top floor, was reserved for parties and such splendid parties with Mr. and Mrs. Butler such splendid hosts.

In the group looking on at the ceremonies was our former resident Dell Butler, who for many years guided the destinies of the P.G.E. Company in this vicinity. He was particularly interested, as "Daddy Butler" was his uncle and during his attendance at the college graduating in 1907, he had classes under him.

Historically, Monmouth was named in 1854 by settlers from Monmouth, Illinois, who established the town for the purpose of providing a home for a Christian college - First named Monmouth University in 1856, in 1866, it was called Christian College. In 1882, it was granted State support and again it received a new name, Oregon State Normal School. In 1939 the legislature added dignity by dubbing this long established school, Oregon Educational College.

We three, with many others, enjoyed touring the campus via bus having the numerous new buildings pointed out. Many remarks "How it has changed since I was here". "I never would have known it was the same place."

Since we three had stayed in the dorm, now known as Todd Hall, named for that indomitable, dignified, always beautifully attired lady, Jessica Todd, we were anxious to see how our old quarters had fared through the years. In our days stark, simplicity was the rule. Nothing escaped the eagle eyes of Miss Todd. We were in bed by ten p.m. and the rooms and occupants were nightly checked. There was no visiting after 7 p.m. on week nights, that was study time.

Talking to one of the present occupants we were surprised to hear there was no such rule now and no curfew either. In fact the girl we were talking to said she had gotten to bed the night before at 5 a.m. The walls of the rooms were decorated by a bewildering array of everything from modern art to wearing apparel. Lots of cupboards, and drawers but evidently they weren't over worked!

We went away shaking our heads and muttering as the older generations always have, "It didn't happen that way when we were young".
