PRO POINTER FOR THE WEEK

For the past few weeks we have been busy conducting classes for beginning women golfers. Once again one of the most prominent mistakes made by women of all levels and by some men has shown up. The

problem comes at the top of the backswing, and concerns the manner in which hand position is achieved. What we are trying to do is cock our wrists and NOT bend them. There is a definite difference between the two.

To attain the right wrist action, try this little exercise of the hands. Stand with both feet on the ground about shoulder width apart, place the club head on the ground and assume a proper grip.

Then without bending either arm at the elbow, lift the club up to head height. At this point look at your wrists. If you have followed instructions, you have achieved the proper wrist action and all you have to do is apply this principle to your swing.

Sandy Nine Loses Sixth

RECREATION REPORT

Lakes Ranger District #8

The combination of unseasonably warm temperatures (96° F.) and thunder showers continues to melt the winter snows. The Oak Grove Fork Road (S-57) is open now to Timothy Lake (just to the Dam). The road is rough and narrow in spots and care should be exercised when driving this road. The Clackamas River Road (S-46) is now open through to the Willamette Forest Boundary. It is possible to drive through to Idana and Mill City over good roads. This is an excellent chance to see the forest in all of its spring beauty. Wild flowers of many kinds are blooming against a backdrop of snow and majestic mountain peaks.

The Riverside Campground Restoration project is complete except for cleanup and some topsoil to cover the riprap material. Grass seeding will be done to make the area more suitable for use.

SPECIAL - Buck deer are now in the process of growing new

antlers to replace the ones lost last fall. Several sightings of deer in the "velvet" have been reported by district personnel. In this stage the new antlers have a soft, fuzzy appearance and are filled with blood vessels. Later the supply of blood is stopped, and the outer layer of skin rubbed off, leaving the tough antler ready for use during the rutting season. Late evening and early morning are the best times for viewing these animals. A good camera with a telephoto lens will enable the "hunter" to bring back a little different kind of "meat for the table."

A series of thunder showers May 5 and 6 brought some lightning and some rain to the district. The rain was badly needed to reduce fire danger and to enable district tree-planting programs to continue.

Fire danger has lessened but potential is still great. Effective midnight May 6 the closed fire season will be in effect.

Woodland Owners Invited To Timber Tax Discussion

Clackamas County Wood-

land Owners are invited to a timber tax discussion at 8 p.m., May 12, Molalla high school, according to county agent, Clayton Willis. This meeting will concern itself with the Western Oregon Small Tract Optional Timber Tax and a discussion of recreation potential in private woodland areas.

Clackamas county leads the state with the number of owners having their lands classified under the Optional Timber Tax, with 81 owners and 9,291 acres. In the state, there are a total of 227 owners with an acreage of 31,023 who have made application for this tax.

According to Willis, the deadline for applications for benefits under this tax is August 8, 1966. The law was passed

by the 1961 legislature to place timber lands on a tax basis according to the productivity of the land. This productivity is determined by the State Forester, according to the ability of the land to produce timber. The highest valued land, site one, is assessed at \$80.00 per acre, with a decreasing assessed value according to the ability of the land to produce.

Application blanks for the Optional Timber Tax are available from the Farm Forester, 419 Main St., Oregon City.

Golden Rose Ski Tourney Entries Arrive

First entries to be received for the June 11-12 Far West Kandahar Golden Rose International Ski tournament are from 15 members of the Canadian national ski team. Leading the list is Canadian Champion Nancy Greene who is ranked by many experts as the world's number two woman skier. The men's field features Roddy Hebron, Canadian men's champion and defender of the Golden Rose trophy.

Competing against the Canadian stars will be members of the United States ski team. Expected in the group are Billy Kidd, Jim Huega and Oregon's own Jean Saubert. Other nations which may be represented at Mt. Hood's first international race are Japan, Great Britain and Norway.

The competition carries a special significance because it is the last FIS sanctioned meet before the world championships to be held this summer in Chilly. During the regular season both the United States and Canadian skiers showed unexpected strength and it is considered possible they could upset the long European domination. It may be June race will fore-shadow things to come.

Other fine efforts were put together by Jim Marcy's first in the two-mile 10:40.4. Ron Nelsons second in the 100 in 11.0 flat and third in the 220 25.0. Glen Danewoods second in the broad jump 19-1/2 Don Wallace second in the mile 4:59.8. Eric Zulauf 2:12.4 second place in the 880 and Pat Burgs 10:54.9, in the 2 mile also taking second. Sandy also had a fine 880 relay time 1:37.7. High jumper John Staffer from Scappoose leaped 6-0 one of the best marks in the state.

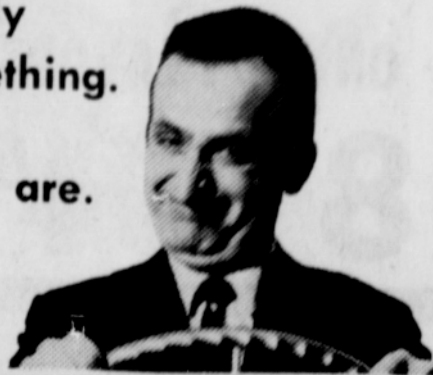
