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Mountaineer Stars Score In Record Breaking Meet

Sandy led by the sensational Jim Martin, broke five grade school standards and tied another as the Mountaineers finished second in the District Meet at Sandy last Friday.

Martin, the greatest of all hurdlers in the Sandy annals shattered his old records of 9.2 in the high hurdles and 13.3 in the low hurdles by flying to times of 9.0 and 13.1 as he had little trouble outdistancing the rest of the field. He is undoubtedly the man to beat in the county spikefest at Centennial this week.

Brent Peterson also turned out another of his always brilliant track showings by breaking the 220 mark of 25.5 lowering it to 25.2 and tying the century mark of 10.8. Pete also won the broad jump with a leap of 17-1, the reason for this poor mark is, the Sandy soarer scratched his first two attempts. Measuring from the board on these miscues, the tape showed 18-7 and 19-3 which is really fantastic because Pete's record is 18-2.

Randy Huserik, Sandy's shot putter finally came into his own winning the event with a heave of 46-7 1/2 breaking the school record by 19 1/2 inches. Randy's previous best was 41-2 almost 5 1/2 feet less. After "Huserik's" spectacular exhibition of flipping the iron ball he let out a shout of joy crying, "I won! I won!" while he leaped in the air.

Roger Williams liked his school mark in the pole vault to 9-6 from 9-4 and just missed on his only attempt at 9-9. Roger didn't let out a victory cry but was just as pleased with himself as Randy was. One of the greatest performances was turned out by Gresham's Ray Akrie in the 880. Akrie in fifth place trailing Bill Reed of Parkrose by a good 50 yards at the 660 mark ran the final 220 in 27.2 to tie Reed at the wire. They were both timed in 2:17.8.

The Sandy Seventh graders as usual also made an exceptional display of track power with Dennis Weisen leading the way. Weisen took first place ribbons in the 75, 9.3, and the high jump, 40-10, a school record tied there. He also placed second in the 100, 11.8. Vern Fox garnered the other first in the hurdles with a time of 9.4, Randy Ackers was second in the broad jump, 14-2, Les Shafer, third in the 660, 1:47 and John Warren, third in the pole vault, 7-6.

Art McMahon got a first in the hurdles in 10.1 the Sandy sixth graders only points. Sandy sends seven men to county in 13 events not counting the relays. Since you have to get at least a second in district in order to go to county the Mountaineers fared pretty well.

Trails on the Columbia Gorge are snow covered at about 3500 feet. Spring snow is hard packed and should not hamper trail use too much. The rock columns that endangered trail users on the Wahkeena trail were brought down last week with dynamite and a big roar. The trail is safe now and you are invited to enjoy and use this trail.

HUNTING

The carp are coming up in the shallow waters of the Columbia. They are considered a trash fish and the archer can find a lot of fun with bow and arrow shooting them. They destroy spawning beds and eggs of other game fish. We need a lot less of them.

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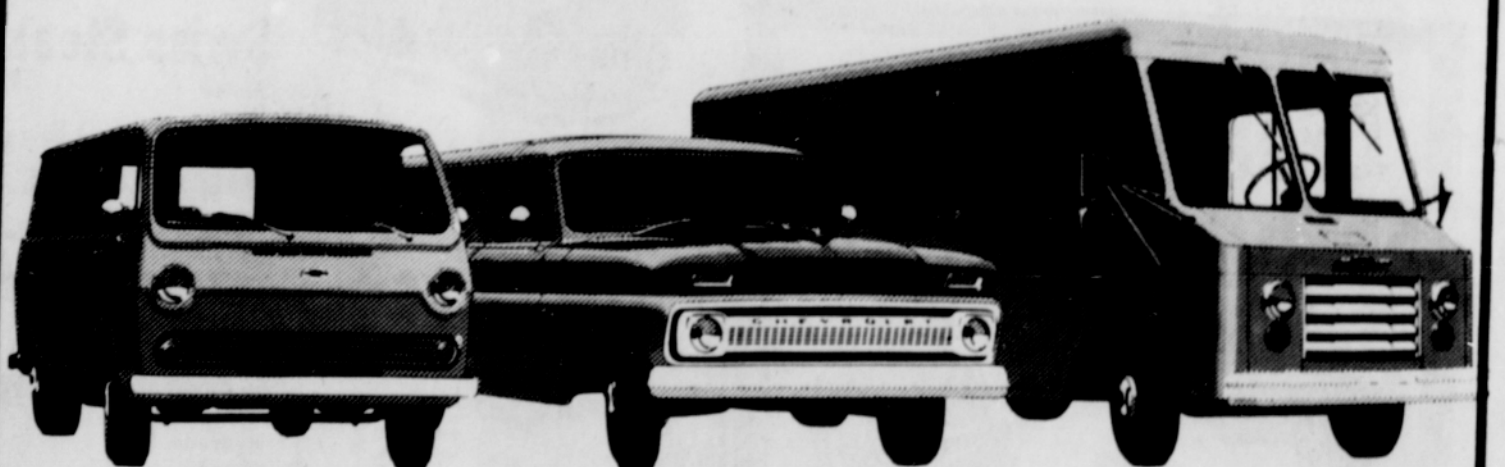
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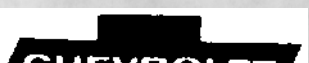
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
