Columbia Salmon Closure Eyed

Phil Schneider, state game director, today advised Oregon sport fishermen that a close watch is being maintained on the Columbia River summer chinook run with the view of closing the river to sport fishing if the run continues low.

Schneider reported that biologists expect another poor return of summer chinook in the Columbia system this year. He said the status of the run is being reviewed by the game commission and the Washington Department of Fisheries.

Last summer a similar emergency closure was ordered when the summer chinook run provided to be one of the lowest on record. The closure did not affect steelhead fishermen.
