The Orth property, to be known as Springwater Estates, is adjacent to the new 861 acre Clackamas River State Park, and has a panoramic view of Mt. Hood, Mt. St. Helens, Mt. Rainier, Mt. Adams and the lower Clackamas river. The state-owned 861 acre tract is being developed into a new, Metro-area Park and will include picnic, camping, sport, swimming, a possible golf course and other recreational facilities.

Also, a primary school, with grades 1 through 6 and a capacity of 500 students will be built on Springwater Estates. The school is scheduled for completion within three years. Orth disclosed that the 1 to 5 acre home building sites will be open to the public sometime in July.

PUC Hits Phone Service

Oregon Public Utility Commissioner Jonel C. Hill said his agency was keeping a close watch on developments at West Coast Telephone Company during the next few months. The company presented the PUC with a detailed plan for improving their service in response to PUC demands.

"The situation there reached intolerable levels," Hill said, "and something had to be done. We forced the issue with West Coast through threats of a public service hearing. Now we'll watch with intense interest to see that changes in management and procedures actually result in better customer service."

Hill added that repeated customer complaints to the PUC had demonstrated that company promises for improvement had not come true since the West Coast merger into General Telephone. Of the more than 45 telephone companies under PUC jurisdiction, he said none has had as many service problems as has West Coast.

West Coast has initiated a top level study of all operations and offices. In addition, the company has made several changes in management personnel and has sent a letter to each customer advising them of improvement plans. West Coast representatives and PUC staff members met Wednesday to discuss a detailed outline of studies and policies which, if effectively implemented, will result in improved service.

"This is a comprehensive and workable plan," Hill said, "but we're going to check the progress week by week to make certain the steps they outlined are being followed."
