

June Wedding Unites D. Wyatt, A. Fleshman

The Community Presbyterian church in Sandy was the setting for the morning wedding of Donna Louise Wyatt and Allan Duran Fleshman on Saturday, June 4, 1966.

Baskets of white and pink carnations decorated the church as Reverend Edward Neuenfeldt performed the double-ring ceremony for the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald M. Wyatt of Sandy, and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Orval M. Fleshman, also of Sandy.

Given away by her father, the bride chose a long gown of bouffant Chantilly lace and net. Her nylon net veil was held in place by a flower of seed pearls. She carried a white Bible containing a 57 year old handkerchief which was handmade and had been carried by one of her mother's relations when she had been married in 1909. On the Bible was a bouquet of white carnations surrounding a single white orchid.

In keeping with bridal traditions, "something old" was the handkerchief, "something new" was the Bible, "something borrowed" was her wedding dress, and "something blue" was a blue garter she wore.

Her bridesmaids, dressed in green and white dotted swiss dresses, carried mixed pink and white carnation bouquets. They were Miss Maurena Mock and Miss Susan Miller of Sandy, and Miss Darlene Slater of Portland.

James O'Brien, of British Columbia, was best man, and John Schenk was ringbearer. Ushers were Don Hutson, George Coleman and Bruce Rowland, all of Sandy.

Mr. Howard Berger sang "Because" and the "Lord's Prayer". Mrs. Clarence Bennett was organist.

Approximately 150 guests attended the reception held in the Social Hall of the Church. The bride's aunt, Mrs. Howard Tone, of Portland, poured coffee; her aunt, Mrs. Wilbur Spickerman, of The Dalles, served punch. The wedding cake, made by Mrs. Katherine Leech of Sandy, was cut and served by Mrs. Anna Spickerman (the bride's grandmother).

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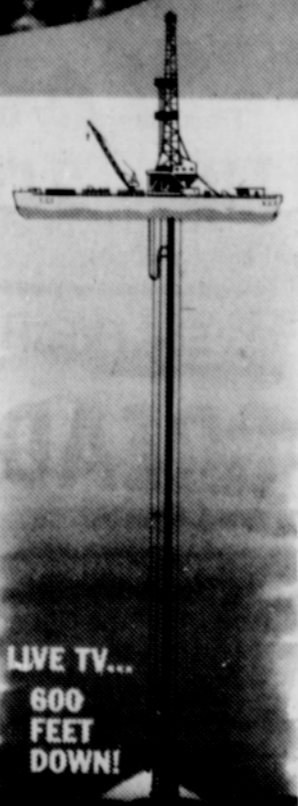
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
