This week we are going to take this opportunity to impress upon you how you can improve your golf game. Instead of checking into the local news let's look to the big leagues of golf.

Two weeks ago the National Open was staged and won by Billy Casper. Last week the Western Open was played and again Billy Casper was the king. These two tournaments are two of the biggest and most impressive of the year. How did Billy Casper come out on top of both tournaments? Putting is the answer in both cases. As Arnold Palmer was quoted after the U. S. Open, "Bill Casper has got to be the best putter on the tour." -- Remember the old saying, you drive for show and putt for dough.

The fastest and most sensible way to lower your golf score is to putt better. To putt better you must do very definite things while striking the ball. The object of course is to strike the ball with the club face square to the hole. You can insure this by keeping the back of your left hand going towards the hole at all times and at the same time keep the right palm moving in the same direction. Also you have to keep the club moving on a straight

line. The straight line must run from behind the ball and then straight through the ball and toward the hole. Remember now, the best way to improve is right on the green, and everyone has a green right in their own front room.

Had a note from Mrs. Leslie Duncan. She says she is one person on the mountain that is very close to the war in Viet Nam. She has five grandsons, Staff Sergeant, Kenneth Duncan, who is in Viet Nam. Lt. Wilton (Bud) Roberts at Thule Air Force Base and Corporal Dan Nixon at Fort Ord. They are all married and with families. On the waiting list in college are Mick Hoffman of Salem, Jim Duncan of Portland. Her neighbor Chip Meyers is in the service. Another neighbor Larry Bartley, and she hasn't heard for several weeks where he is stationed. She wanted to wish them all a safe return, and soon.

Took a jaunt down to Paisley, Ore., and then over to Burns. Had planned on fishing in the Cheewaukan River at Paisley, but it is so low, it hardly is wetting the rocks. They use it for irrigation, but have had to ration it by, letting it run in one ditch for five days, then cut that one off and let it run in the next one for five days. They are putting in a new bridge across it into Paisley, and have a stop light. People in town are having a lot of fun over their first stop light. Say the big cities have nothing on them.

Had a most pleasant visit with Edith and Lu Withers, in Paisley, then on to Burns. David went to Burns to fish, and I went to look for a bridge, and I found it. Naturally, there is a story behind all this.

Mr. Dorner, who is the Engineer for the Mt. Hood Local Water District, at one time was an engineer for the State Highway, and that's where I got the following story.

It was back in '32 or '33, they were to construct a bridge over Poison Creek, just outside of Burns. This is just a small bridge, about like they construct across a large irrigation ditch. When they began work, a very elderly lady, from a near-by farm house, came out to see what they were up to. They informed her they were going to build a bridge. She was mighty pleased as she had wanted a bridge there for some time. She was all of 4 feet 8 inches tall, complete with bonnet and apron. Every day she came out and watched the progress on the bridge, always with the bonnet and apron.

When the bridge was close to completion, she asked Mr. Dorner if she could be the first lady to cross it. He took her to the construction engineer, and she asked him. He said, she not only could be the first lady to cross but the first person. They wouldn't have the approaches in yet, but he would fill the approaches with gravel, so she could cross, and they would call her when they were ready.

Needless to say she was thrilled. When the big day came Mr. Dorner went over to her house to tell her they were ready for her to make the trip. She came out, in bonnet and apron, went out to the barn, opened the doors, and there was a model T Ford. She cranked it herself, got in, backed it out and across the bridge she went, down the road to where she could turn around, and then back across.

She put the car in the barn, closed the doors, went into her house, laid down on the bed, and died. In time the story reached the head office of the State Highway Department, and in 1937 they put a brass plaque on the bridge. The plaque says:

SUSAN'S BRIDGE
SUSAN DIXON WHITING,
PIONEER OF 1883,
DIED 1937

WIFE, MOTHER, CITIZEN.
And that is why I wanted to go see Susan's Bridge. The plaque is on the side of the bridge instead of the front, so no one really sees it, unless they are looking for it, in fact I could find no one in Burns, of the few I talked to, that even knew it was there. As usual we ran true to form, and took some rain with us. Not enough to do the farmers any good, but enough to make it miserable for us. Went out to the Chickenominy Reservoir to fish. No one was having very good luck, and the
