Baby Feeding Costs Charted

Feeding a baby costs upwards of \$150 a year, according to estimates of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, reports Mrs. Helen McDowell, Clackamas County Extension Agent.

Economists in the USDA have developed food plans to use as guides for estimating the quantities of food to buy in a week for various family members, including babies. The nutritional adequacy of these plans is based on the National Research Council's Recommended Dietary Allowances.

For food of the kind and quantity adequate for children seven months to one year, the recent estimates of cost range from \$3 to \$4.20 per week. The estimate for the moderate cost level is \$3.90.

At higher cost levels the amount of milk, meat, eggs, citrus, and other fruits and vegetables to buy increases, and the amount of flour and cereals decreases.

Most mothers take advantage of the convenience and variety offered in prepared baby foods. Studies show that the commercially prepared baby foods are sometimes more expensive to use than their home - prepared counterparts, but not always, states Mrs. McDowell.

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Mounties Overrun Scappoose

The Sandy Mounties collected 18 hits, including two homers and one triple, in pounding out a 15-4 victory over Scappoose Wednesday, June 29, and kept them hot on the heels of league leading Orient.

The Mounties roughed up Scappoose's starter Ricky Yost for 11 runs on 14 hits in 6 innings including pitcher Chuck Moody's two-run homer in the second inning and were never headed.

Dean Phelps' singles in the third and fourth drove in a pair of runs and Sandy wrapped it up in the sixth with a four-run four-hit attack during which Nick Ruegg and Chuck Moody singled, Mike Hite tripled and Randy Huserik ripped a homer.

Moody went the distance gaining his second victory against one loss allowing only five hits while fanning 12. He was also a star with the bat collecting three singles and a homer in four trips, scoring four runs and driving in two more.

The win runs Sandy's record to 4-2, one game behind Orient's 5-1 standing.

Desert Stardust, More Ability Doggie Darlings

The Multnomah Kennel Club launched its 1966 greyhound racing program with Desert Stardust pre-rated as the probably favorite of fans.

The Yuma Park, Ariz. favorite drew the No. 1 box for the MKC Inaugural, the ninth race of Wednesday's 11-race program which launched the 34th annual meeting at the Fairview track near Gresham.

Desert Stardust failed to win in six starts at the MKC track last year, but the white and brindle favorite of the Frances V. Downing kennel started 27 times at Yuma, winning 12 times, taking six seconds and three thirds.

More Ability turned in a 5-5-0 performance in 16 races at Cloverleaf Park in Loveland, Colo. and is expected to rate second with the MKC fans.

The opening night program launches a season which expected to attract more than the 17,911 who wagered \$409,374 on opening night last year.

The dogs are scheduled to run nightly Monday through Saturday, with a 7:45 p.m. starting time for the first race.

Household Hints
