SOIL, WATER and PEOPLE

Conservation practices applied by land owners this year are hay and pasture seeding, ponds for wild life and recreation, tile drainage and forest management.

Land owners are using technical assistance furnished through the North Clackamas Soil and Water Conservation District.

Hay and pasture seeding total over 100 acres. Improved varieties of grasses and legumes were used. Fertilizer was applied according to soil tests. Excellent stands were evident on all fields.

Small ponds were completed by H. C. Kruger and Park Lumber Company, Estacada; Dick Wheldon, Sandy. Permits are pending on three more to be built before fall. These water storage projects are for private recreation, wild life and fire protection.

Twenty-thousand feet of drain tile have been installed by District farmers. This is an excellent land treatment practice. Drainage reduces excess water from the surface and subsoil. Clem Ault and Vic Bowman, Estacada area, are woodland thinning sixty acres apiece. Bowman has sold some hop poles and cord wood from his 36 year old stand of Douglas fir.

Mt. Hood Okayed for Lower Division College Courses

The Oregon state system of higher education has prescribed a two-year course of study for students who intend to transfer to senior institutions after two years at a community college.

This prescription applies to each major area of study: music, history, philosophy, agriculture, speech etc. Mt. Hood Community college, has received approval of commencing lower division college courses in all the major transfer curricula. While every required course for every transfer program may not be available this first year, Mt. Hood will be able to offer at least 71 per cent of all programs.

The following list shows relative availability of necessary courses for several of these major transfer programs. In the pre-professional courses of study the following curricula are entirely available to all students: art, architecture, business administration, secondary education, home economics, journalism, dentistry, law, medical technology, medicine, nursing, and secretarial science.

At least 80 per cent of the courses necessary to complete the first two years of the pre-professional programs will be

available in these programs: agriculture, applied science, elementary education, engineering, music, forestry, and pharmacy.

In baccalaureate major programs, the following are offered: English, philosophy, foreign language, speech, general arts and letters, social science, anthropology, economics, history, political science, psychology, sociology, biology, chemistry, mathematics, and microbiology.

Approximately 75 per cent of all necessary courses in the following areas will be available this first year: geography, botany, entomology, geology, physics, and zoology.

In those programs where 100 per cent of the required program is not offered, the classes not available are generally sophomore level. This situation exists because most of the entering students will be freshmen.

During the second year of operation, the college plans to add a large number of sophomore classes to the curricula, so that second year students will be able to get all necessary course work done in two years before transferring to a senior institutional.

Letter From Chon

Note: Chon Saekok was Sandy's '65-'66 exchange student. She is now touring the U.S. before returning to her home in Thailand.

Today Chon is staying at a home in Washington, D. C. Her tour leaves tomorrow for New York City, and her home in Thailand.

Where has she been since she left Sandy on June 24? What has she seen? What are her feelings as her departure from the U.S.A., now draws so near?

Dick and Dee Steffi, Chon's American parents, took her to Albany where she met with other AFS students returning home following their year in the United States. In Albany, they were taken on a pressed-wood industry tour. In Eugene, Chon related: "We watched them shoot the movie 'The Way West', but unfortunately no one is allowed to go close to that area unless they have some relationship with the movie stars."

On Saturday night, a big banquet was scheduled in Albany. Chon's reaction to this: "The banquet turkey is really good. They divide it into four pieces. You should see how big one piece, I ate only half of a piece. I wish you were with me. After the big dinner, we sang and talked, to get acquainted."

The group of A.F.S. students left Albany by bus Sunday morning, June 26, at 8 a.m. For Chon it was more farewells with the family she stayed with there. Here, from a letter to her American parents, is part of Chon's diary:

"We had lunch in Bend - a break in Burns. By the time we arrived in Boise, everyone seemed happy to see a beautiful city." Here she spent her first night out of Oregon, staying with another American family. The chaperone of the group asked Chon to do a Thai dance, but her costumes for the dance unfortunately were packed and waiting for her in New York City. She plans to substitute one of the outfits she has with her. Out of the 44 students on the bus, there are 5, including Chon, from Thailand. Twenty-four countries are represented.

What are Chon's feelings for her Sandy parents? Her own words express very definite homesickness: "It is unbelievable that I have left you. My feeling is that I come to visit some city around here and going back to our home after that. But everytime I realize that I am going farther and farther each day -- it gives me a shock that I can hardly believe it. But it is true that I will wander farther and farther until the farthest place, that is my country. Then comes a hope and wish - hope to see you again, even though I still don't know how can I get here, I think you know how much I miss you, I don't stop thinking of you even though I am having fun. The bus trip is really great."

Chon's most recent letter continued: "I am now in Cheyenne, Wyoming. I don't have any activities here so I find can spend time to write. We
