Starting earlier this month with golf and bowling tournaments, the Festival officially opens tomorrow with the selection ceremonies to be held in the old high school auditorium at 8 p.m.

On Saturday morning beginning at 6 p.m., the Estacada Fire Department Auxiliary will start things off with their annual festival breakfast at the fire station. At 9:30 a.m. there will be a Kiddies Parade, followed by the Big Parade at 10 a.m. which will wind its way through the streets of Estacada. TV's Rusty Nails will act as Grand Marshall of the parade.

Hood Phone Cable Stakes Hit Snags

The Hoodland Telephone Co., is now in the process of staking the mountain area to define the route for the new buried cable system, according to information received from P. C. Slade, Telephone Co. engineer.

Slade revealed that, for one reason or another, many of these stakes have been removed or destroyed. In addition to the extra costs involved, the engineer told the Post replacement of the missing stakes is causing undue delay in the project which has only a limited amount of time for completion.

The company is making every effort to install the new system prior to its December deadline, Slade said, and requested the cooperation of mountain residents in preserving the positions of the identification stakes until the cables have been buried.

Slade reported that installation of aerial portions of the cable along the highway is already in progress, and said laying of the buried cables is expected to begin some time next month.

The building, located in the rear of Gresham Linoleum on Main St., Gresham, will be ready for use in September. Automotive and manpower development courses, designed to provide skilled workers to meet the demands of the changing economy, will be among the educational program offered.

College President Critical Of 'Duplication' Laments

Dr. Earl Klapstein, president of Mt. Hood Community College, lashed out at Portland's walls of "duplication" and took a critical view of Oregon's delegation in Washington in a speech before the Gresham Chamber of Commerce at its regular noon lunch Monday at Eastmont Lanes.

Dr. Klapstein said Portland's "constant cries of duplication of programs is creating a hindrance to some educational programs in the state and is also standing in the path of progress."

The college president told Chamber members no word has been received from General Service Administration in Washington concerning the property at 148th and Halsey which once was pledged to the college for a permanent campus.

In referring to the site, Dr. Klapstein said "the Oregon delegation in Congress could give more help to this project than it has in the past."

Touching on progress made to date by the college, Dr. Klapstein said his staff is ready to start moving into the fairgrounds to prepare for Mt. Hood Community College's first classroom sessions on Sept. 19. We will do this just as soon as this year's fair is over he added.

Key members of the faculty were introduced by Dr. Klapstein at the meeting and each outlined briefly the courses to be offered and the problems faced in each department.

The three major departments include transfers, vocational-technical and adult education. Programs for each have been approved, instructors have been hired and the program is ready to go, Dr. Klapstein said.

The transfer program embraces those students who plan to complete their two years of community college work and then transfer their credits towards a degree at a four-year institution; the vocational-technical program is designed to train students for gainful employment with technical skills, and the adult education program will be primarily evening courses designed for those 18 years of age and over and includes a non-credit enrichment program offering varied and interesting courses.

Each enrichment course requires 10 or more students and classes will meet on a once-a-week basis for three hours in a 10-week course.

The vocational - technical program is a pre-employment type plan to train students in the basic skills such as automotive, electrical, secretarial science, agri-business and horticulture. Later the college hopes to add a one-year course in practical nursing in cooperation with Gresham General and Woodland Park hospital.

Dr. Klapstein said the college had recently completed a plan under which the college would train within the next year 170 employees for Electronic Specialty Co.

Dr. Klapstein, speaking on rumors that legislation will be introduced in the Oregon Legislature to limit the registered nurse training program to Portland State College, Klamath Falls and Corvallis, said such legislation would be a gross mistake and make Oregon one of the very few states in the nation having such restrictive

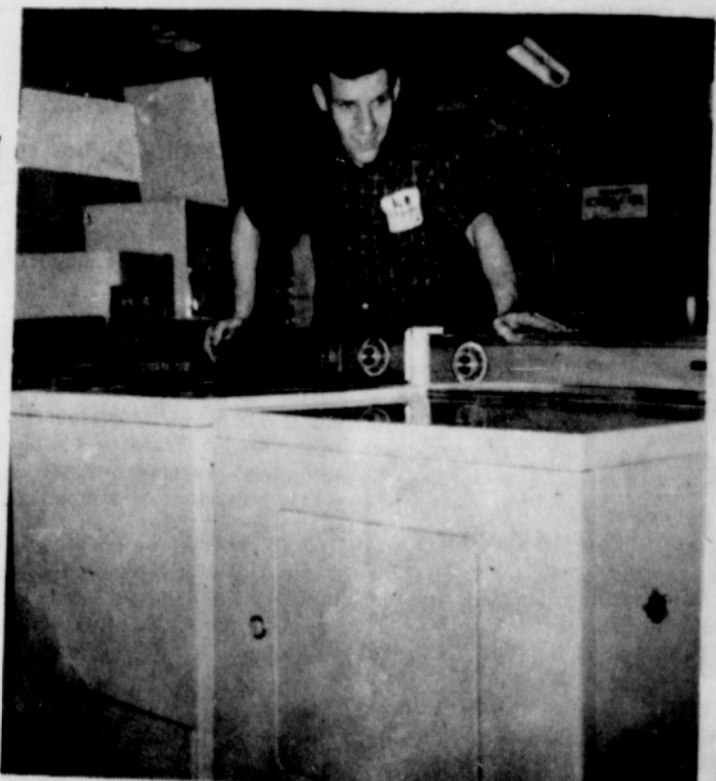
