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Library Gears For Students

Development of the college library is moving ahead rapidly, according to Eleanor Pruitt, college librarian.

"We will have nearly 2,500 books by the time classes start. During the fall quarter the holdings will be increased to about 5,000 books," Pruitt said.

The three-member staff is currently assigning Library of Congress call numbers to the books as they are received. Then, they are further prepared for circulation.

The college library "will have the basic reference books and the other books necessary to provide strong support for our college transfer and vocational-technical programs," the Librarian stated.

The current staff consists of Librarian Pruitt, Loretta Chang, cataloguer, and Emma Magnuson, secretary. Sara Blake, a student assistant, is helping in preparing the library for the opening day.

Accredited College Transfer Program Starts This Term

Mt. Hood Community College is offering a full curriculum in Lower Division College Transfer courses that have been approved by the Community College Committee of the State System of Higher Education.

To insure transferability of credits to all state four year institutions, this committee approves both course offerings and instructors of all community colleges in Oregon.

"The standards set by this committee and their interest in providing excellent liberal arts and pre-professional education in community colleges makes the community college lower division program equal to that offered in our state colleges," said Leo Marlantes, Dean of Instruction at Mt. Hood Community College. "Our instructors are required to have Master's Degrees in their teaching fields. This insures our students instruction by teachers that know what they are talking about."

No full-time instructor at Mt. Hood Community College, teaching

in the lower division transfer program, has less than a Master's Degree.

A student attending Mt. Hood Community College thus can meet the requirements of nearly every pre-professional program offered at any Oregon State institution and all liberal arts and sciences requirements.

PE Curriculum Planned

There is a wide range of Physical Education classes available this fall. Definitely slated are swimming, golf, skiing, bowling, and dance.

Horseback riding will probably be included. There is a possibility that a class at a pistol and rifle range will be offered, according to Vernon "Dutch" Triebwasser, Health, Physical Education, and Recreation division chairman.

There is also a possibility that women's figure control class and a men's conditioning and weight lifting class will be scheduled.

Adult Education Night Courses

Mt. Hood Community College will offer a variety of courses in the Adult Evening Program ranging from full-credit transfer courses to general enrichment courses that do not carry credit.

The Evening School is prepared to offer any desirable course requested by groups of ten or more individuals, providing suitable facilities and a qualified instructor are available. The cost will be \$10 per course for enrichment courses. These classes will meet once a week usually over a period of ten weeks, starting in the latter part of September.

The general enrichment program could include such areas as Income Tax Preparation, Basic Bishop Sewing, Interior Decorating, Conversational Spanish, Modern Math for Parents, and Furniture Upholstery, as well as similar classes in the creative arts, homemaking, and commercial fields.
