'Introspective Image' First Campus Art Show

The media of expression where moods, concepts, colors, textures, shapes and other aesthetic and emotional values are placed in a visual image, stimulates the individual in many ways. By viewing and studying media of this nature, one may emphatically experience the innermost feelings and thoughts of the artist. He may also gain a greater appreciation for the subject matter and thereby broaden his conceptive outlook. It is generally accepted that as an individual observes art work, he experiences the phenomenon expressed by Gertrude Stein, "I am no longer when I see you."

The art exhibit program at Mt. Hood Community College is planned to allow the student and the community the opportunity to "see" others by experiencing the result of their abilities. This year's exhibit program is energetic and is intended to stimulate and satisfy the artistic curiosity of the immediate public. The opening exhibit will begin in September and is entitled "Introspective Image". The subtitle of this show—"Sub-Conscious Minds of the Arts"—indicates that it is strong in the expression of our overall goal. "Introspective Image" originates from southern California from whence comes much of today's art. This is a brand new show and its opening at Mt. Hood Community College marks its debut into the world of critics.

The plans of the exhibit committee are to bring a show to the campus each month of the school year. At least one of these shows will feature local artists who paint as a hobby. Another exhibit is planned to give the local professionally trained artists an opportunity to display. In these two exhibits, it is intended to accomplish two major goals—to offer stimulant to the local artists to create and to offer to the community an opportunity to become acquainted with the creativity of this area. Some of the other exhibits are planned to bring in work of those individuals who have achieved a certain amount of acclaim. At times it will also be possible to offer an opportunity for the community to meet the artist at a special reception. The remainder of the shows will be travelling exhibits pulled in off the national circuit. They will feature a certain type of art with several artists who excel in that media.
