Logging Truck Accident Kills Eagle Creek Woman

A log truck that failed to negotiate a right angle turn on Highway 211 at Eagle Creek Monday afternoon overturned and killed Mrs. Ida May Crow who was standing in her front yard.

Mrs. Crow was killed instantly when she was buried under the log load as the truck and trailer tipped over after side-swiping a metal guard rail at the edge of the Crow front yard.

It was feared at first that the Crow's son, eight-year-old John Merle, was also a victim of the freak accident, but he was later discovered playing in a neighboring yard.

Authorities were still clearing away logs in their efforts

to recover Mrs. Crow's body when her husband, Merle Crow, arrived on the scene after learning of the tragedy at work.

Priests called from Milwaukie administered the last rites of the church at the scene and her body, in charge of Coronor Douglas Pratt, was removed to Clayville Mortuary, Estacada.

Driver of the truck, James Brown, Sandy, escaped without serious injury but was taken by Sandy ambulance to Gresham General Hospital.

Requiem mass for Mrs. Crow, who was 56, was held at 9 a.m. this morning at St. Aloysius Catholic church with interment in Fern Hill cemetery, Aberdeen.
