He flew to Cape Kennedy last December to prepare for the May moon shot. Two simulated moon shots were performed prior to the May success. In order to insure precision in the delicate instruments used, the technicians use silk gloves, and change into sterilized clothes before entering small booths to work on the instruments. Forrest Egman returned to Cape Kennedy on July 25 to prepare for the next moon shot. He lives with his wife, Love, and 16-year old daughter, Diane, in Santa Monica, California.

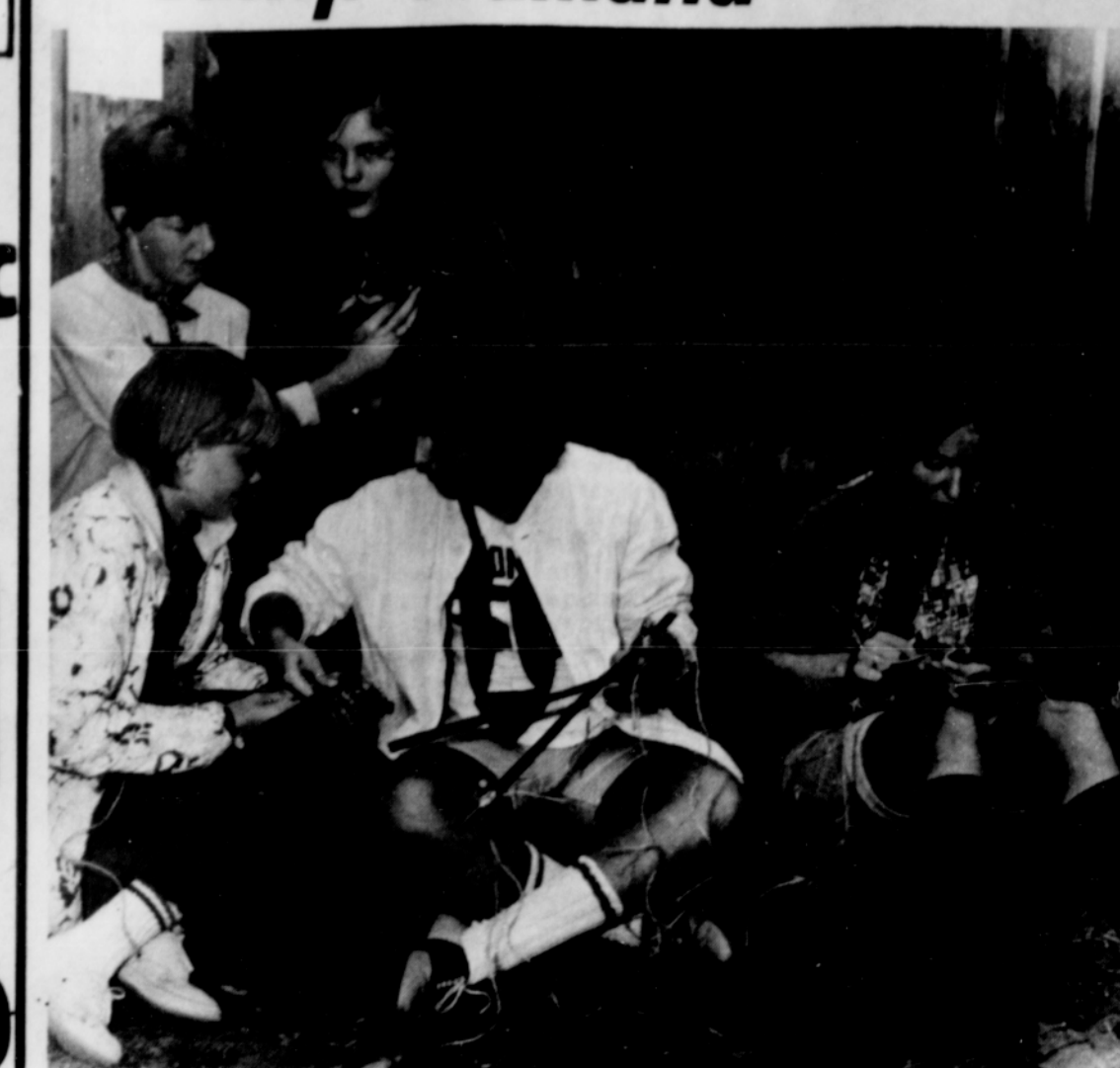

These then are the major groups of game hawks and falcons. There are minor groups based on other plumage not mentioned, but with the basic collection above, you'll never need them. Use them and you'll catch fish with more regularity than with any other single group of flies.

TIP OF THE WEEK When streams are low, use a sparsely dressed game hawk fly line and cross stream drift fly without drag, just as you would a dry fly. You can see the fish take it, and it is a great thrill as dry fly fishing.
