New License Applicants Need Identification Proof

Beginning Sept. 1, all applicants for original Oregon driver licenses must present positive proof of identification prior to obtaining application forms.

The new regulation is designed to prevent falsification of license applications, reduce age discrepancies, especially on minors' licenses, and aid in establishing a permanent driver license number system based on birthdays.

New Program Offered by High School

Sandy high school announced today that a new program in the field of special education will be available for the first time this fall.

The classes are designed specifically to help those students who will not be going on to college to qualify for jobs upon graduation. Stan Bowman, who will conduct the classes, said students enrolled in the program will receive academic instruction in the mornings while afternoons will be devoted to elective tutoring and vocational preparedness courses.

Students will be given high school credit for on the job experience obtained while working in such places as grocery stores, gas stations and restaurants, Bowman explained.

said the new regulation was currently being used in more than 20 states.

Under the new requirement, any applicant must produce positive proof of identification when applying for an original driver's license or an instruction permit. Any applicant under 21 years old must also produce proof of age.

The best proof of identification and age is a birth certificate or certified copy thereof.

All applicants, regardless of age, must present proper identification prior to receiving an original or instruction permit form. Suggested documents, other than the preferred birth certificate, are: baptismal certificates including the date of

birth which have been issued one year prior to application; papers issued by a court of record, such as adoption papers or legal name changes; identification cards issued by the Armed Forces or Selective Service System; alien registration cards and United States citizenship papers or original passports.

In applying for a duplicate license, credit cards, voter registration cards, professional and membership cards will fulfill the requirement.

All documents presented for identification purposes will be examined and returned by the examiner of licensing clerk in any of the 36 field offices of the Department of Motor Vehicles.

Serious Fire Danger Listed by Officials

Serious fire danger exists throughout Oregon and the situation will worsen, said Ronald E. Smith, the State Forestry Department's fire control executive assistant, in Salem.

Six rainless weeks, heat and strong east winds have combined to bring on one of the most dangerous conditions since 1952, he pointed out. And the notorious September east winds are yet to come, which would bring danger to "explosive," unless substantial rains fall between now and September.

"On state protected lands there have been 995 fires against a total of 842 for the same date last year," he said. "In the lightning category, we are about even—Stephen with last year, having had 379 compared to last year's 387. In man-caused fires, however, there has been a sharp rise with 616 opposed to 455." He said that figure worried him for if it keeps up at that pace,

it heightens the risk of disastrous fires as the danger continues to climb and the fire load increases in the districts.

Smith commended the fire districts for their quick, aggressive action thus far, because, in spite of the season's severity, acreage has been held to about 7,500 acres.

How bad is the season? "With the early start that it had, it is the worst season in the past 14 years. By mid-June, spring rainfall was only 30 per cent of normal. The early summer showers consequently had little long range effect, as they were not sufficient to soak into the heavy fuels," he explained.

"Right now fuels are critically dry, as is evidenced by the explosive fire behavior of late. It would take substantial rains to reduce fire danger to a low rating," he said. Apparently, there isn't much chance of this occurring. "The extended forecast simply does not indicate anything out there in the Pacific to make rain out of," he said.

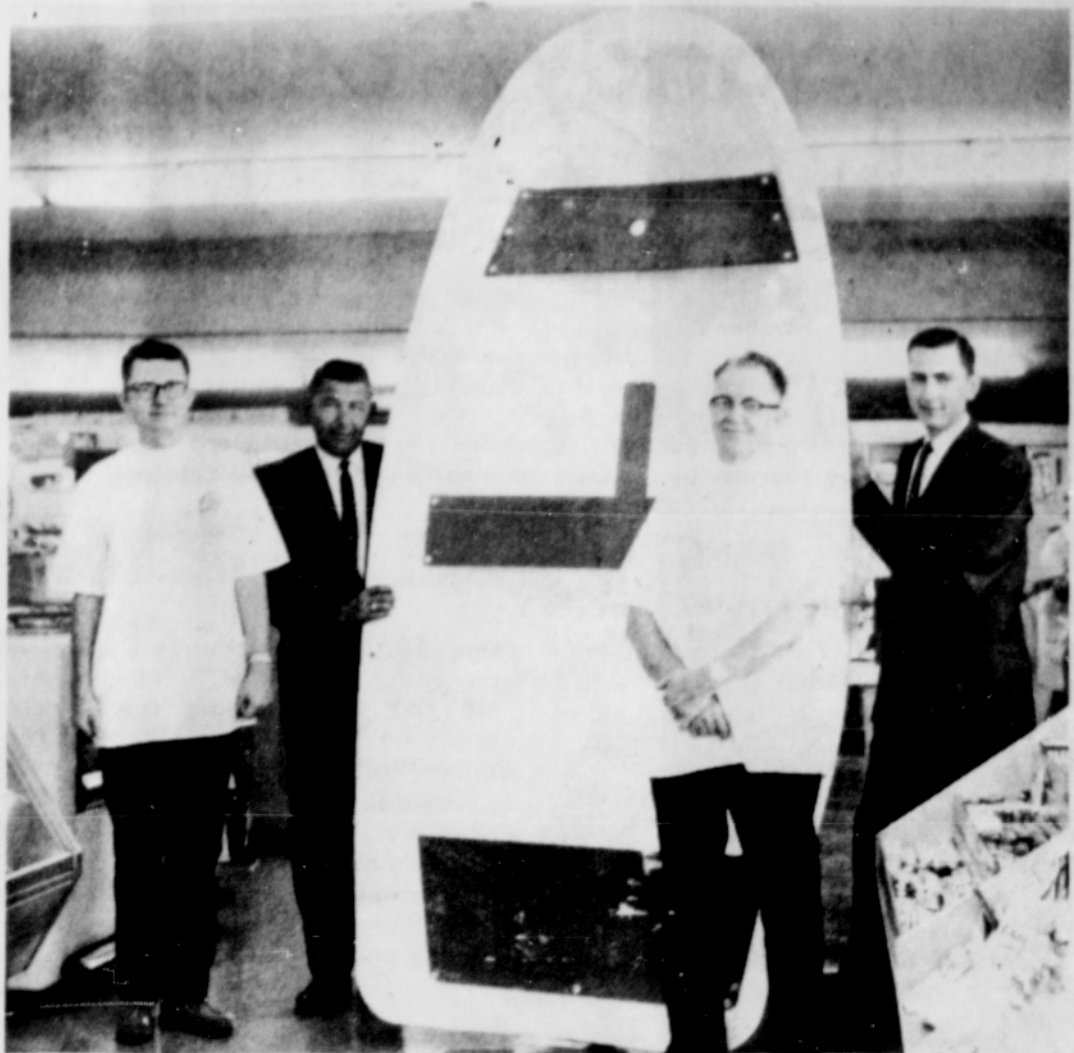
The story was written by Lillian (Averill) Ten Eyck, known to most readers as the author of the Post column, Pioneer Days.

When Mrs. Ten Eyck first came to Oregon with her family from Princeton, Ill., in 1911, she was a young girl just out of school. Her father, a newspaperman and teacher, had talked of moving to the frontier for years until she said the whole family finally became imbued with the urge to "Go West!", and left their comfortable home in the settled country of Illinois for the wilds of Oregon. The Averills, father, mother, two sisters and a brother, settled near Cherryville and Lillian later began teaching school at Marmot, where she met and fell in love with George TenEyck, the brother of one of her pupils, and member of a pioneer Oregon family.

She and George were married at the old Cherryville church on Aug. 27, 1918. The description of their honeymoon trip into Jefferson Park was contained in a letter to her brother, Archie, who was then in France with the AEF.

The TenEycks made their home on Marmot Ridge for many years. George died in 1965 and Lillian sold the farm this year and moved into Sandy. She has two sons, George Jr., who teaches at North Bend, and Ross, a logging engineer at Ripplebrook Ranger Station.
