Pioneer Farmer Dies in Farm Mishap Aug. 25

Robert Samuel Strebin accidentally met his death Aug. 25, when the tractor he was driving on his farm tipped over and crushed him. "Bob" was born Oct. 5, 1895 at Troutdale, the son of Pioneer parents, Samuel and Oliver Wheeler Strebin. He attended Cedar school, (south of Troutdale). The Strebin family were land owners in the early days of Oregon, and were farmers by trade. Bob was born in an area two miles from his present farm, that was almost a wilderness, and had lived with and worked with the land and the people, until the advent of specialized farming, and the Metropolitan areas. He was a good part of its growth.

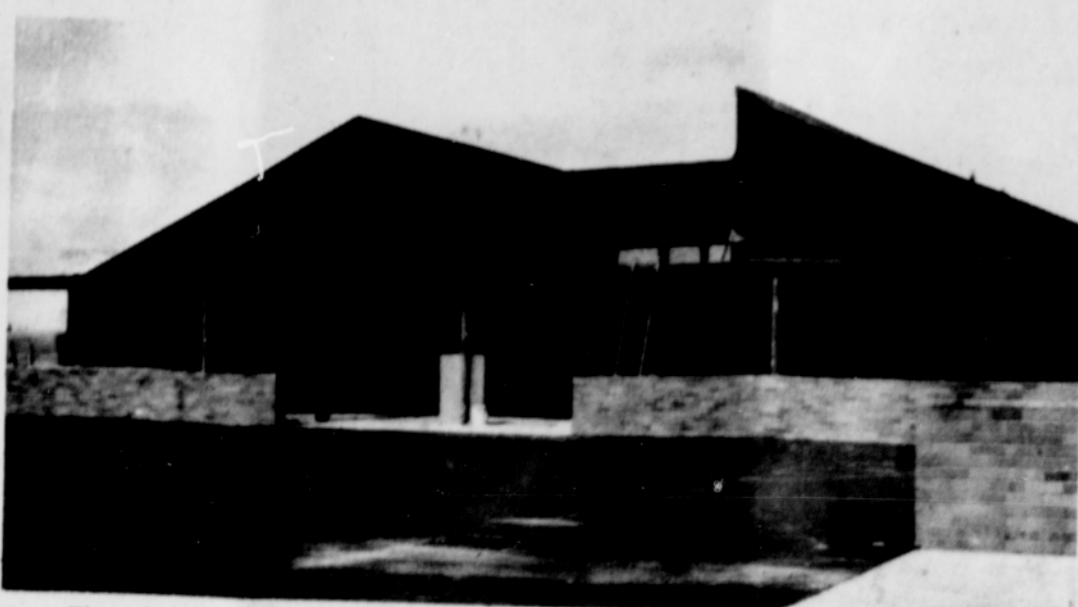
Bob purchased his farm in 1910 and was very proud of his Double Registered Polled Hereford cattle. He was an ardent fisherman and hunter and at one time owned a pack of Cougar hounds and was called upon many times to use them. Before the war, while he was younger, he was for many years a member of the Board of Directors of the Gresham Berry Growers. He was a member of the Troutdale Presbyterian church. July 24, 1934, in Gresham he married Vera M. Crow. From this union, one son, Robert S. Strebin Jr., of Richland, Wash., survives. One brother and one sister also survive, John C. Strebin and Mrs. Besse Schneider, both of Troutdale.

Funeral services were held Monday, Aug. 29, in the chapel of the Carroll Funeral Home, Entombment was in Lincoln Memorial Park. Rev. Oscar Payne offered the services and Mrs. Melvin Gradin played the organ.

What's Cooking?

FISH CHOWDER
1/4 to 1/2 lb. salt pork or bacon. Fry until soft. Dice two large onions. Add about 4 cups hot water to the onions and bacon and cook together for 30 minutes. Dice raw white fish (cod or sea bass), add three diced potatoes, little salt (begin with 1/2 tsp.), 1/2 tsp. garlic salt, 1 Tablespoon vinegar, 1/4 cup cooking sherry, 3 bouillon cubes, parsley flakes to taste, and 1 can (large) evaporated milk added to first mixture and simmer 1/2 hour or longer. DO NOT BOIL. If chowder is not thick enough, you may add 1/2 package of instant potato chips. This is very delicious chowder and very filling.

BIRDIE'S ZUCCHINI RELISH
Grind coarsely and mix together 10 cups zucchini squash, 5 cups ground onions, 1 red and 1 green pepper. Sprinkle with 5 Tablespoons salt, let stand overnight. Drain, Rinse. Drain again very thoroughly. Add 2-1/2 cups vinegar, 1/2 Tablespoon dry mustard, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 3-1/2 cups sugar, 2 teaspoons celery seed and 1 teaspoon nutmeg. Simmer 30 minutes or until clear. Seal in sterilized jars.

WALDORF FROSTING
Mix well 1/3 cup flour and 1 cup milk and simmer, stirring constantly until flour is cooked.

CRISP CHOCOLATE COOKIES
1 cup shortening
1 cup cottage cheese
1-3/4 cups sugar
2 teaspoons vanilla
2 eggs
2-3/4 cups flour
1/2 cup cocoa
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 cup chopped nuts
Cream together the first three ingredients with mixer, add vanilla and eggs and beat again. Sift together the four dry ingredients and add to first mixture. Mix well and add chopped nuts. Chill dough overnight or for several hours in refrigerator. Make into small balls and roll in powdered sugar. Flatten. Bake 15 minutes at 350 degrees. Makes 72 cookies.

CRISP CHOCOLATE COOKIES

Counties Receive Cash From National Forests

An all-time high of nearly \$26 million will be paid to 30 Oregon and 27 Washington counties as their share of receipts from the National Forests in fiscal year 1966. The payments being mailed

to state treasurers represent 25 per cent of the receipts from all resources and uses of the National Forests -- timber harvest, grazing, minerals, recreation, power and other land use.

Shares are proportioned according to National Forest acreage, with the money earmarked for public roads and schools.

Clackamas county's share of the money, \$1,185,281.82, was the third highest in the state and was topped only by Lane county's \$4,777,586.62 and Douglas county's \$2,819,084.82. This year's total for the Pacific Northwest Region of the Forest Service -- \$25,824,836.65 -- is \$4 1/2 million more than a year ago. Oregon counties this year will receive \$19,694,122.16 compared to \$15,614,589.57 last year. Washington counties will receive \$6,130,714.49 compared to \$5,685,489.60 last year.

Since 1906, Oregon counties have received a total of \$188 million, the Washington counties more than \$80 million. In addition to the money turned into the federal treasury and the 25 per cent returned to the counties, there are many other National Forest benefits, it was pointed out by J. Herbert Stone, Regional Forester. Payrolls and permanent improvements are examples of tangible benefits. Some intangible benefits, such as recreation, contribute to the well-being of millions of persons.
