With the recent filing by a fourth candidate, Kenneth R. Burdick, for the upcoming three vacancies on the city council, it appeared, for a while at least, that there would be some life added to the dull city election picture.

However, apathy was almost immediately restored to the scene when one of the candidates, the Rev. William Rose, announced his withdrawal

from the race because of his coming transfer to a church at McMinnville.

Unless some willing candidate or candidates are found to vie for the positions before Friday's filing deadline, the city election will be strictly Dullsville and were it not for the general elections, Sandy's disinterested citizens, having dis-enfranchised themselves locally, could well stay home in November and watch TV.

Hatfield vs. Duncan on Viet-Nam

Both Gov. Hatfield and Rep. Duncan deny that the one big issue in their Senatorial campaign is Viet-Nam.

Yet when such a long-standing Republican as Ben Doerkson of Gresham comes out for Duncan, "because of Viet-Nam," you just know it is the issue.

Where do the men stand on Viet-Nam?

Duncan's position is extremely simple. He stands 100 per cent behind the Johnson policy in Asia. There isn't even the slightest hint of disagreement.

The Johnson policy can be oversimplified as "containing Communism." The thesis is that unless Communism is stopped in Viet-Nam, it eventually will over-run all of Southeast Asia.

Actually, it is much more complex than that in fulfillment, but stopping the Viet-Nam and/or Chinese Reds is its essence.

Hatfield, too, agrees that the Communists must be stopped but he ques-

McCall Shouldn't Be Hurt

It doesn't appear that Tom Lawson McCall, Republican gubernatorial candidate, will be hurt by failure of the 1½ per cent limitation to get on the ballot.

Edward Fadeley, Oregon State Democratic chairman, had criticized McCall for what he called a "gross mistake" in estimating the number of signatures needed.

However, Fadeley's charges pretty well collapsed when Al Gildemeister, president of the Oregon Homeowners Assn., said McCall was in no way at fault.

tions the way we're trying to do it. He has several suggestions:

(a) Turning the Viet-Nam issue over to the United Nations. Vetoes by Russia and France could be circumvented by going to the General Assembly.

(b) A new or reconvened Geneva Conference, involving both North Viet-Nam and Red China. (Suggested, incidentally, over the weekend by Anthony Eden.)

(c) A real cease fire coupled with a diplomatic offensive. He says we've never tried both simultaneously.

Hatfield very vigorously denies that he is being an appeaser or is sympathetic to draft-card burners and those who try to block troop trains.

Obviously, we agree completely with Hatfield. And according to the polls, so do growing numbers of the American people. They just don't see much sense in the way things are going now.

The verdict here in Oregon will have repercussions far beyond our borders.

The formula which McCall used was devised six years ago and had been used without challenge since then.

Fadeley's charge obviously was inspired by the fact that the campaign of Robert Straub, Democratic candidate for governor, is sagging badly. Democratic leaders privately concede that Straub doesn't have a chance unless something drastic happens.

Fadeley seized upon the 1½ per cent fiasco as the hoped-for miracle. However, it won't work, particularly in view of Gildemeister's statement. At least, Fadeley tried.

NURSE RESOLUTION

The Oregon State Board of Health recently adopted a resolution about the training of nurses and allied medical personnel. The resolution was sent to Manpower Council, members of the Oregon legislature, the State Department of Education, and the governor.

In part, the resolution noted members of the State Board of Health "have been shown by the president of Mt. Hood Community College that his and other junior colleges are able to provide the RN degree while the students live at home."

The resolution said that the development of medical programs at the community college level as lagged in this state as compared to adjacent states. The Board of Health

recommended immediate action on the part of the citizens of this state to bring about the accelerated development of courses in the community colleges for nurses and allied medical technicians.

Portland Community College is first with 4800 students, followed by Lane (2100), Treasure Valley (1020), Southwest Oregon (940), and Blue Mountain (783). Next comes Mt. Hood with 750, followed by Bend (652), Umpqua (600) and Clatsop (475).
