A THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

Do you recall how Pope John fathered an improved fraternal feeling between people of all faiths? Do you recall how, for the first time in history, he—a Roman Catholic—was eulogized by leaders of religions: Catholics, Jews and Protestants alike? Today, we see further evidence that this great man's hopes for eventual Christian unity may some day become a fact.

For example, a news report tells how 2000 Christian clergymen joined Jewish leaders in writing a letter to Soviet authorities. Included as signers of the letter were leaders of seven large Protestant denominations and three Roman Catholic cardinals. Their letter condemned Soviet anti-Semitism. Even while their own religion were being restricted in the Soviet, this mixed ship. Remembering the shades and shames of Hitlerism, they further pleaded with the Soviets to "cease making Jews the scapegoats in the governmental campaign against economic crises."

Their letter may not mean a thing to the Soviets. Probably won't. But the united action in sending the letter stirs more than hopes to and for God loving people everywhere.
