## PICKINGS

News from SANDY OPPORTUNITY CENTER

Everyone gets nostalgic at times - this is my mood as I write my last column for Pickings. My Vista year is completed and I leave for my home in San Francisco next week.

It has been a rewarding year. A Vista's life begins with training - mine was at the University of Oregon in Eugene. It was a privilege to have met Dr. Ray Loew and his staff. They worked tirelessly in their efforts to make us realize the objectives of the poverty program. Even in a short six weeks period we learned much.

All of Oregon seems to be a garden. The beautiful mountains with snow capped Mt. Hood topping them all, have been a daily inspiration to me while living in Sandy these last few months. No matter where you drive, I found beautiful rolling countryside covered with stately fir and hemlock trees; and fertile valleys giving yield to magnificent crops in the spring and summer.

Raspberries and strawberries will especially remind me of Oregon which is famous for its berries. Only a labor of love, such as the farmer has for the soil, can produce such crops. And what a love for the earth the migrant has as he picks the crops. It has been a wonderful experience to meet both the farmer and the migrants. They toil together from sun-up to sun-down with Mexican-American, Negro, Indian and Anglo (as the whites are called) working side by side. All have one thing in common - their love of God's Good Earth.

The migrants are like birds in flight going from one crop to another until all the harvest is in and then returning to their native state. I have learned from these men and women of the earth. They are an independent group, proud and fearless in spite of their many privations. They come into the community silently and leave the same way. Someway must be found to provide the migrant and his family with decent housing, particularly for those who wish to settle in a community. Also a better understanding on the part of the community must come about.

Driving along the winding roads has so often brought back memories of our home, Eagles Nest in New Hampshire, which also has much natural beauty. The Indian Reservation at Warm Springs has a barren beauty of its own. There are many small Indian homes and if you visit one, you may find a little papoose like I did. It really thrilled me to see a little baby strapped to his board with a tiny head piece made of beads. This primitive life made me realize how many Indians are living like their forebears lived centuries ago.

The rain in Oregon (and there is plenty of it) makes it such a lush green state. The flowers bloom profusely everywhere. Most everyone has a garden. There are two gardens in particular that I will always cherish in memory. Mrs. Forman's on Bluff Road, with the delightful home which she has named River's Bend, is one of great beauty. Every flower that

you can think of grows in harmony and the blending of the many colors is truly a lovely sight. Her kindly hospitality and friendship I will carry away with me as a most pleasant memory of Sandy. The other garden is that of Mrs. Joseph Spies in Portland - the City of roses. Mrs. Spies is a friend of my son's. Her wonderful friends, like herself, all are dedicated to helping others. She has a lovely garden with a delightful small hill that protects it. It was a real joy! On one of the trees a small plaque which reads:

"The kiss of the sun for pardon the son of the birds for mirth One is nearer God's heart in a garden"

Than anywhere on earth." Both of these women are unforgettable characters - each in a different way. What a happy privilege to have met them. To receive the beautiful silver sword from Mrs. Fallon of the Oregon State Cancer Society brought back a flood of memories.

Mr. son Peter's visit on my birthday during the airline strike was a real problem. But he got here with the messages from his dear family and my daughter-in-law, Norma. This all meant so much to me. The happy garden party of Elaine Furumoto with the Vistas and the young tutors, Carolyn Cook and John Gell. All the things that the young Vistas and I have done together I will always cherish. They are a fine little group Elaine Furumoto, Richard Meyer and Harold Macy will always have my warm affection. All has not been easy, but we managed to get over the hurdles.

Driving over hill and dale to the dusty camps offendid terribly to me as I had to pass the great lumber trucks - but I leaned to do it. Passing the Washington Government test for a license gave me a real satisfaction.

Not knowing anyone in Sandy two friends who meant much to me were Dr. Leavitt, my physician and friend, and the Rev. Neuenfeldt whose never failing help meant so much to Elaine and me when we organized our first emergency day-care - without it we could not have survived - it was an experience. To our kindly friends, Mr. and Mrs. Ning - the extra little things that they did for us meant much to one far from home.

I will miss my association with Woodburn (The Valley Migrant League's Headquarters). The kindly editorial office staff of Don Wilcos, Priscilla Carrasco and Judi Jarvil always made my weekly visit a happy one. Phil Peters, VML Director of Vistas has been a most understanding friend. To my own staff Kenneth Killary, Lee Cunningham, Archie Gress, Kathy Hoag and Herman Clemmer - I say good-bye and God bless you in your continued work to help find a way to help the migrants.

## GREENWICH AS 'O'

Greenwich, England (suburb of London), was established as the beginning point of longitudes by a conference of 26 countries meeting in Washington in 1884. Universal time zone throughout the world were then set up, based from Greenwich as "Longitude O."
