## Hatfield Seems to Be Pulling Ahead

Regardless of how one feels personally about the Hatfield-Duncan race for U.S. senator, just how is it going?

An AP wire story over the weekend says that two major polls indicate Gov. Hatfield has moved slightly ahead.

The respected Waterhouse poll shows Hatfield, so the story goes, ahead by 1 1/2 percentage points. A poll by the Clark, Bardsley, Harlacher organization also has the governor in front.

The polls are paid for by the political parties and for obvious reasons, aren't disclosed to the public. However, both confirm what political observers have felt in recent weeks... that Hatfield is pulling away.

We've had the same feeling locally, too. Duncan was in front until about three weeks ago. Then, the Hatfield campaign began to click, or perhaps it was Duncan's campaign that began to bog down. Whatever the

reason, Hatfield now seems favored, even in heavily Democratic East Multnomah county.

Of interest have been the many school polls, every one of which shows the governor in front. These invariably are a good barometer of how the vote will go.

The one big intangible now is just what the Duncan camp may have up its sleeve. A visit by Pres. Johnson reportedly is in the works according to The Wall Street Journal.

A triumphal return by the president, so the story goes, might do much to aid lagging Democratic campaigns in California, Oregon, Montana and Illinois. This also could be a considerable risk since LBJ isn't the most popular president.

However, there apparently are large numbers of undecided voters and the race is far from over. A visit by LBJ just might be enough to turn the tide once again to Duncan. Then Hatfield and Co. would have to come up with something.

## We Support Edith Green

We continue our editorial election recommendations this week, this time heartily in support of Edith Green.

We think Mrs. Green, incumbent Democratic congresswoman from the Third District, is clearly the superior candidate.

She has a long and distinguished record in Congress, she knows and understands the problems of her district and her constituents, but even more important, she is a person of character and principle.

We haven't agreed with everything she's done in Congress—far from it—but nevertheless feel she represents

the people of her district as well as anyone possibly could.

We touched earlier on her character, her devotion to principle. A couple of examples should suffice... her vote against repeal of Section 14B of Taft-Hartley because it didn't provide protection for those with religious reservations, and her decision to appoint a Gresham postmaster on merit, not politics.

Neither one of these were "smart" politically. But they were dictated by her conscience. We can't ask for more.

Mrs. Green certainly deserves support for re-election.

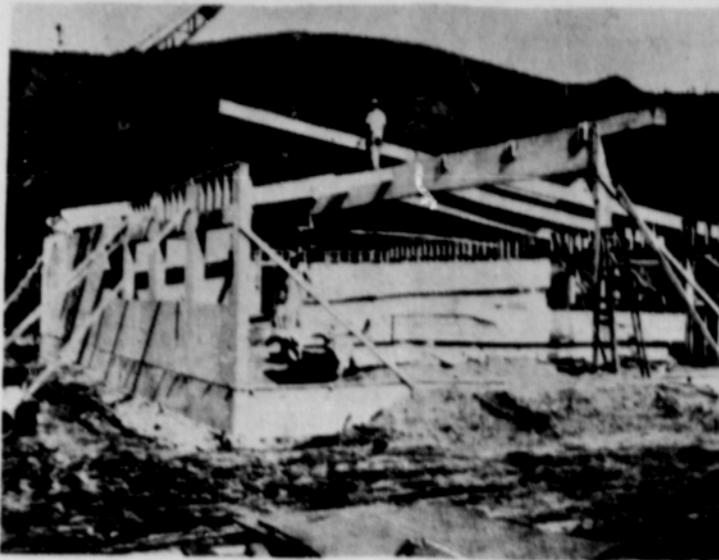
## Symphony Bills Spivakovsky

Violin virtuoso Tossy Spivakovsky, long established as one of the most sensitive artists among the world's ranking performers, will appear with Maestro Jacques Singer and the Portland Symphony as soloist in Sibelius' Concerto for Violin and Orchestra. Performances are scheduled for Nov. 7-8 at the Oriental Theater at 8:30 p.m.

Russian born and Berlin educated, Spivakovsky has made sensational music news ever since his American debut in 1943 when he introduced the Bartok Concerto with the New York Philharmonic. This concert, which the ailing Bartok himself attended, marked the start of the widespread acceptance of the Hungarian composer and launched the concert career of Spivakovsky as recitalist and soloist with most of America's major orchestras.

In addition to the Sibelius concerto programmed for the three concerts, Maestro Singer will conduct the orchestra in "Chaconne in E Minor" by Buxtehude, Haydn's "Oxford" Symphony, and Ginastera's "Estancia."
