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The Grocery Pickets

We don't like the big grocery bills any better than the next guy but it seems to us that housewives are just plain wrong when they blame everything onto the grocer.

Sure prices are high, but taking it out on your neighborhood grocer isn't even scratching the surface of the problem.

Everyone in the whole food distributing process has a part in high prices... the farmer to the processor to the wholesaler to the distributor to the grocer.

The housewife, of course, sees only the end result... what she has to pay on the grocer's shelf. But anyone with even an elementary knowledge of economics should know that the grocer marks up over his cost. If his cost goes up, obviously he has

to increase the selling price. He doesn't have any control over the price he must pay.

We've worked with grocery stores (in connection with advertising) long enough to know that their margin of profit is pretty low to start with. Only by doing a big volume of business can they make a reasonable profit.

The problem of rising food prices comes from inflation, pure and simple. The inflated prices in every field—which we think can be blamed directly on Washington, D.C.—are only being reflected in the grocery store. Badgering your neighborhood grocer isn't accomplishing much. Demanding that the government halt, or at least curtail, its expansive give-away programs might do a great deal more.

Viet-Nam... After the Election

Now that the election is over, just what is going to happen in Viet-Nam?

The administration obviously has been treading lightly until after the votes were cast. But there have been some straws in the wind.

Up at Fort Lewis, Wash., for instance, an expansion in training facilities has been announced. Selective Service had cut draft calls because, quite simply, there weren't enough places to put the draftees. Obviously, there soon will be and higher draft quotas can be expected.

Despite the succession of rose-colored statements from Sec. McNamara and friends, it's the military's feeling that 750,000 men soon will be needed

in Viet-Nam. That's roughly twice what we now have.

It's also likely that the war soon will be expanded—by Hanoi or Peking or Saigon—into Cambodia and Thailand. Then we'll need even more men and supplies.

In addition to higher draft calls, we certainly can expect a tax increase to help pay for the mounting costs of our adventure in Viet-Nam. There just aren't enough tax dollars to go around right now.

Whatever the election decided—and it's still too soon to say—it's obvious that we must find a solution to end the mess in Viet-Nam. And we think a diplomatic solution is far preferable to a military.

A Home for the Community College

It comes as no great surprise that Mt. Hood Community College has ruled out the County Fairgrounds as a site for its permanent home.

There just wasn't enough space, what there was quite likely would have proved far too costly, and problems with the water table precluded high-rise construction.

Now, it appears virtually certain that a site just northeast of town—at Stark and Kane roads—will be chosen. The property is contiguous to the new Gresham Golf Course, which is inside Gresham's corporate

limits. Thus, the college property also will be annexed to the city.

The Stark-Kane site lays beautifully for a college and architects are enthused over its possibilities. If necessary zoning etc., is accomplished, classes might begin there next fall.

The projected building program should be adequate for foreseeable needs for 10 or 12 years. It still is close enough to downtown Gresham so that the economic impact of the school will be felt here.

Altogether, it is an excellent site and we hope the college board can make its acquisition certain.
