7th-Day Adventists Vote Record Budget

Delegates to the Autumn Council of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists have voted a record 40-million-dollar budget for 1967, up nearly 700-thousand dollars from this year, reports George W. Chambers, pastor of the Sandy congregation.

Appropriations ranged from

two and three-quarter million dollars for Loma Linda University in California to \$872 for a water tank and fencing to keep out wild pigs at two mission stations in New Guinea. Also voted were \$14,000 to the American Bible Society and \$22,000 to Christian Medical College in Vellore, India. Three servicemen's centers received a total of \$92,000.

The council voted to hold its next quadrennial world conference June 7 through 17, 1970, in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

The annual Week of Devotion and Prayer is being conducted in the Sandy Seventh-day Adventist Church by Pastor Chambers, who will call for the annual Week of Sacrifice Offering at the morning service, Saturday, Nov. 12.
