"It is a great surprise to find some parts of Bangkok look very similar to the U.S.A. American movies, foods, and shopping center really give you a feeling that you are in U.S.A."

"I'll start teaching English in the evening which I am asked to."

"I send my love to the people I know. I haven't got a chance to write them yet."

Sandy Dorcas Society To Move Headquarters

The old church building which was used for rummage sale headquarters will be used by the Dorcas Society of the Seventh-day Adventist Church beginning December 7. Mrs. Bessie Reinholdt, who is in charge of the church's work in distributing food and clothing to those in need, stated that this move was necessary because the space in the main church building formerly used by the Dorcas workers was needed in meeting the growing needs of the church.

The Sandy Dorcas Society is one of more than three thousand similar Seventh-day Adventist organizations which assisted over ten million people with eleven million articles of clothing, along with food and cash, for a total dollar value of over twelve million dollars last year, according to Mrs. Reinholdt.

Those needing help are given assistance regardless of race, creed, or color.

This humanitarian work is made possible by the members of the church, although gifts received from their friends and neighbors during the present and forthcoming Ingathering Campaign will be used to assist in carrying forward the medical, educational, and assistance program of the church, the Dorcas leader explained. Part

of the funds gathered in this area will be used here in relief to the needy, in addition to the food, clothing, and other assistance given locally, she added.

Mrs. Reinholdt said anyone wishing to donate clean, usable clothing and bedding, also furniture, may bring it to the Center, at Proctor and University on Wednesdays when the Dorcas group meets.

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A THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

Religious customs and rituals have long been a stumbling block in the path toward Christian unity. But, bit by bit, we see one breakthrough after another as the block is being chipped away. It is nowhere near as huge as it once was. It may not take centuries after all, for the block to be completely removed. For example—

In an ecumenical student conference at Ohio University in Athens, Ohio, it was reported that some 3,000 Roman Catholic, Orthodox and Protestant students participated with 48 clergymen of different denominations and celebrated Holy Communion in a common manner acceptable to all faiths. Their action proved once again, that with God's guidance, where there is a will, there is a way.

The group reverted back to a Communion ritual of the 3rd Century, of a period prior to the divisive split in Christendom. Old, traditional customs of the individual denominations were ignored. The conference celebration Communion with the liturgy attributed to Saint Hippolytus of the 3rd Century. Incidentally, Hippolytus was a controversial character in his time. 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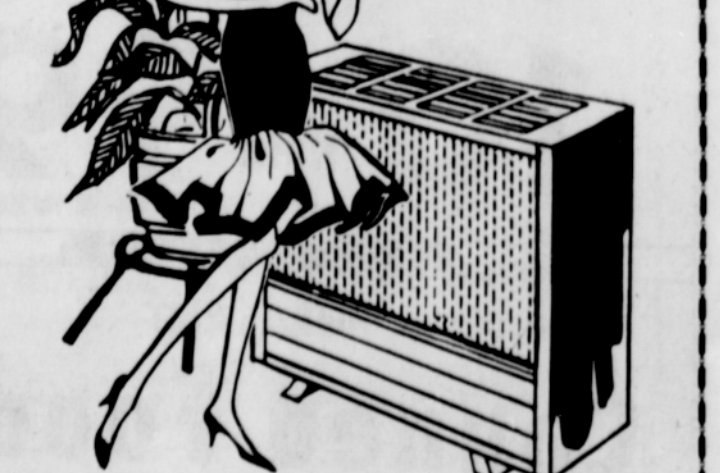
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
