"Stop Smoking" Plan Offered

A five day stop smoking plan will be conducted at the Gresham high school May 1 through 5 according to Pastor Preston Smith, local director of the session. Co-director is Dr. J. Stewart Lloyd, Gresham physician. Time for the sessions are 7:30 to 9 p.m.

People are becoming more aware of the need to stop smoking in view of current scientific facts linking lung cancer, emphysema, and heart disease with smoking said Pastor Smith.

"One out of every three deaths in the United States is caused by smoking related disease, and as many persons die each year as a result of smoking cigarettes as die from cancer," according to Dr. Ashbel C. Williams, president of the American Cancer Society. He further pointed out that grade and high school children "continue to court lung cancer, heart disease and other cigarette-caused disease."

The Five Day Plan was developed by a clergyman, E. J. Folkenberg, and a physician, Dr. J. Wayne McFarland, and has been conducted in major cities in the United States, and many overseas countries.

The plan of group therapy presents psychological and medical aids for "kicking the habit." Scientific films on the subject are offered also. Although the plan was developed and is sponsored by the Seventh-day Adventist church, it is a non-sectarian health program.

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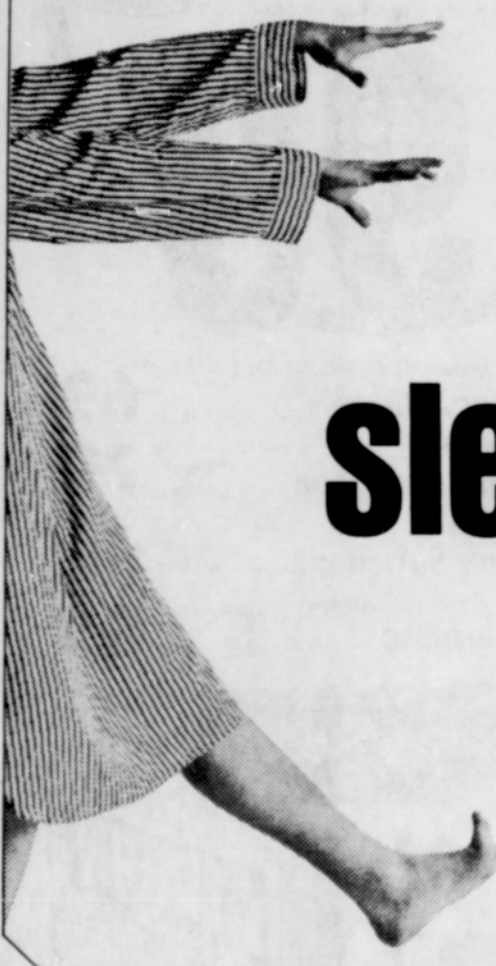
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
