Wyatt Should Stay in the House

Considerable pressure has been put on Congressman Wendall Wyatt who represents Clackamas county, to run for the Senate on the Republican ticket next year.

It certainly appears that Wyatt would have little trouble gaining the G.O.P. nod for the post. But it also seems he would have substantial difficulty in winning the election over either Wayne Morse, the present incumbent, or Robert B. Duncan, both of whom must be regarded as formidable Democratic candidates.

Wyatt has set forth certain circumstances which must obtain before he would seek the nomination; thus his

candidacy is doubtful at this time.

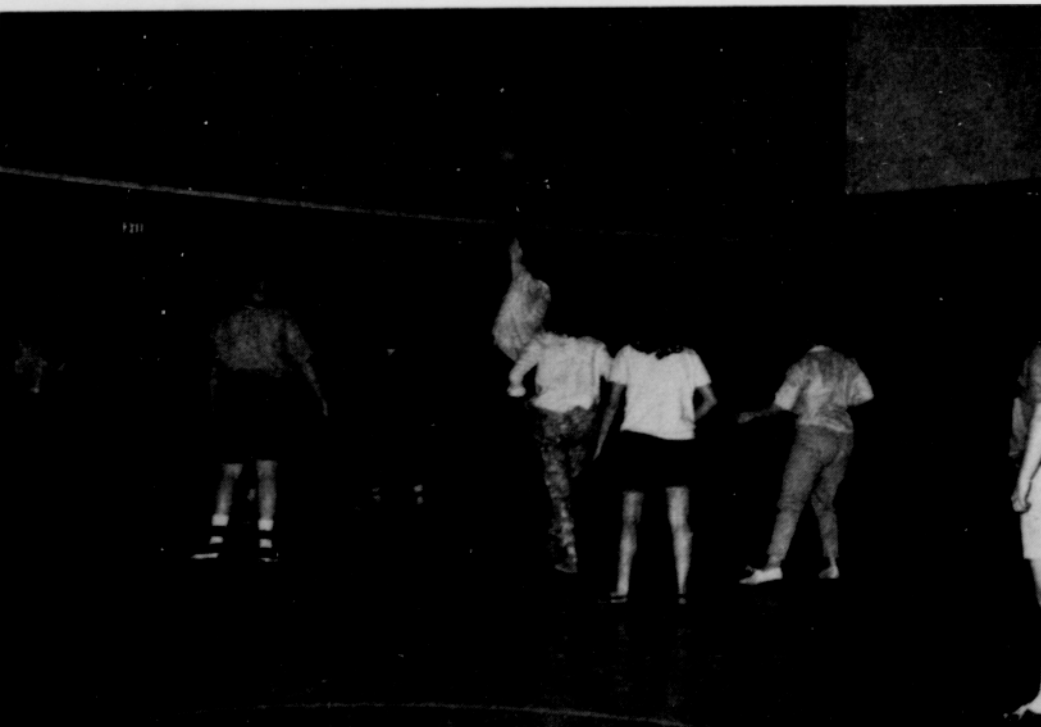
He now has earned seniority on the House natural resources committee (in a national Republican win, he would be chairman next session) and has the advantage of service in the House which can be used to the benefit of this district.

It may be selfish, but from a Clackamas county standpoint, folks here would be best off if Wyatt foregoes the Senate race and again seeks his house seat.

Everyone, we think, is agreed that as last year, this is no contest. As the old saw goes, he's doing a good job now for us in Washington. Let's keep him there.

Bowling, dancing, volleyball, pool, swimming and other games highlighted the post-graduation party of the Sandy High School seniors last Thursday night, sponsored by many local merchants.

The party started at 11 p.m. with approximately 80 graduates signing in at the high school. A number of the teenagers went to the San-Ro-Esta Bowling Lanes by bus and later traded places with those dancing and playing volleyball at the high school.

At 2:30 a.m., the school closed, with many of the grads going to the swimming pool for an early morning swim.

Food was served throughout the night, starting with a mid-

night supper at the high school, and continuing with snacks. Later, an early morning breakfast was served at the bowling lanes.

During the evening, the teenagers were shuttled back and forth from the high school to the bowling lanes and to the swimming pool by school bus, driven by Mrs. Bender.

I received my copy of the Sandy Post and to my pleased surprise, saw pictures of your '67 graduating seniors. What a beautiful group!

I had the pleasure of hearing your "Pioneers" when they presented a concert at our Douglas school. I am enclosing an excerpt from our local paper. They say it much better than I can.

(from the Winston Wire, May 25, 1967)

"Hey! Where was everybody? If you were one of those staying home in front of the television, YOU really missed something live! Remember the announcement in this paper that the Sandy Union High School Music Department was going to give a special musical presentation Friday, May 19? This program was sensational!

"The Pioneers sang several stirring selections; the Buckshots captured the audience and the Stage Band made everyone want to dance...One could not help but admire these young, very talented musicians.

"Of course the program involved a lot more than can be mentioned here, and, to say the least, the audience was completely delighted. Those who came went away with the best

impression possible of Sandy Union High School."

Sandy Hi is rather dear to my heart. In 1917 - (50 years ago) - I was among a group of starry eyed seniors graduating from Sandy Union.

In 1914 it had just attained Union status. I'm not sure of the exact amount of seniors but I think there were 10 or 12.

The one thing that does stand out was the fact it was war-time --W.W.I. There were two flag draped vacant chairs, representing two of our classmates who had gone to "join up". One never came home. It was a year of heart break for many (my two brothers came home safely, but many did not).

Now a few words about your paper. My folks were pioneers in the Dover district and we knew every nook and cranny around there as well as all the people.

I am so glad a gift subscription to the Post was sent to me.

Planning Group Hears OEO Talk

Representatives of the Office of Economic Opportunity appeared at the Sandy City Planning Commission meeting Tuesday night to explain the objectives of the OEO Low Income Housing.

Wallace Telfer, director of low-income housing, said that their housing projects for low income families have been successful in the Clackamas County area and invited the planning commission members to visit the projects.

Telfer also explained that while the property in the low-income housing projects is not taxed, 10 per cent of the rent goes to offset the lack of taxes. He added that rent for the units amounts to approximately one-fifth of the tenant's income.

Others present at the meeting were Howard Stewart, Clackamas County executive

director of OEO, Jessie White, Sandy project director and Donna Coliron, community aid, and Frank Aldrich, chairman of the low income housing board.

Phone Co. Will Place New Cable

A project involving the placing of aerial and buried cable along Bluff Road from Pleasant Avenue to Radford Road at a cost of \$26,130, has been announced by Roger Danek, District Manager for General Telephone Company.

Danek said the project will provide facilities for the future expansion of the base rate area and for the conversion of suburban lines to no more than five parties by the end of this year. Provision has also been included for future growth and regrade requests in the area.
