Discussion of final plans for filling and distributing their annual Christmas baskets to needy families in the area was the main subject of discussion at the Sandy Kiwanis meeting Thursday night.

Members will work in small detachments throughout Saturday afternoon and in force on Saturday night to sort donations of canned goods and toys according to sizes of the scores of families on their list. Site of the operation will be the Sandy Masonic Hall as Kiwanis members and the baskets committee headed by Dan Barker will work into late hours Saturday night to prepare the baskets for delivery early on Christmas Eve.

Kiwanis President P. N. Smoke announced a special gift of \$125 received from the Gresham Elks Club to be used for the Christmas Basket project.

A guest at the meeting was Gresham's Al Larsen, popular ex-Lt. Governor of the Kiwanis District, who invited the Sandy club to an inter-club with Gresham Kiwanians on Monday night. Larsen said the main event of the meeting would be the chartering of a Key Club at Gresham high school and of a Circle K club at Mt. Hood College.

Featured speaker of the evening was Tom Telford, Boring, Telford, a registered engineer, former county engineer and roadmaster, as candidate for Clackamas County Commissioner. He spoke on economy in county government.
