## Pioneer Days

So many Christmas days, Surely no one remembers each one although at the time it seemed the most memorable day. But perhaps one or more stand out in memory.

My first memory is of stealing down stairs in the dark and seeing toys grouped on a table. Strange, only a little wooden bench with two little tubs and a miniature washboard is all I recall. I suppose I played with them but I can't remember.

Later my grandfather, who lived in Massachusetts, always sent a dollar to each of the family to buy a Christmas gift. A dollar wouldn't go far now but in those days a dollar bought a pair of ice skates which I struggled with ( but didn't become any feature skater.) In Illinois there was plenty of ice to practice on, but in below zero weather, it wasn't much fun to slip and slide and bump one's self. And the chilblains! My poor feet, sore in the morning, itchy by the afternoon.

Another Christmas, a dollar bought a beautiful doll. How I adored it and the clothes I cobbled for it, which I conscientiously washed and washed until they fell apart through the stitches.

The first year we were in Oregon my older sister decorated our house with wreaths and sprays of cedar, Oregon Grape and other greens. We were entranced by all the lovely greenery. In fact so much entranced that we wanted to share it and we did. For forty years or more every holiday season a large box full of Oregon's greens went to aunt in Brooklyn. She loved them, too and shared them with her friends. After her death we continued sending them to her daughter until a few years ago when the daughter moved to rural Connecticut where various evergreens were plentiful.

At the little Marmot School the Christmas program was the event of the year. With forty pupils a really worthwhile program could be put on. Such plays, such dialogues, such rousing songs with the audience which came from miles around joining in with might and main. Wonderful fellowship.

After the program, of course refreshments. Besides the usual hard candy and nuts we served oyster soup with George presiding with the ladle. No one

could make oyster soup like his, even when he was just a boy in school.

Just out of the College of Education (Monmouth) while I was teaching in Sandy's two room school, I batched with three high school girls in a three room cottage (with a loft upstairs where we had four cots) The front door had one of those frosty glass panels, the dominant figure was an angel, so we dubbed our home "Angel Cottage" We had plenty of visitors as we all had brothers, two of the girls more than one. I might add there were also several boy friends hanging around on Sundays. In fact there were so many visitors that the lady next door, mother of a spinster daughter of uncertain age was shocked. The wife of the druggist tried to soothe her by saying "They all have brothers" But still the good lady feared that the delicate feelings of her daughter would be hurt. So careful was she of her daughter that she wouldn't allow her to attend a baby shower because as she put it, "It is no place for a young girl."

When Christmas time came around in order to make it easy for our various relatives and friends to choose gifts for us, a long list of the items we hoped Santa would bring was prepared and hung on the wall in a most prominent place, I can't remember it did any good. One of the girls got a durable but ugly grey sweater from her boy friend which shocked her as being too prosaic. I was presented with a huge spray of holly tied with a brilliant scarlet bow which pleased me so much

that I made a water color sketch of it.

I asked a niece of mine if she had a special Christmas memory. O, yes. Soon after her marriage she and her new husband thought it would be fun to get their Christmas dinner like the pioneers did. They bundled up warmly and with a shot gun tracked up and down through the snow for miles but all they saw was a grouse which they shot, took home, and roasted with some potatoes. My niece said nothing had ever tasted so good.

All these Christmas days with their various gifts but the greatest gift of all would be peace and that reminds me of the story.

A little girl who saw soldiers on parade, asked, "What are those?" She was told, "They are soldiers." "What are soldiers?" she asked. "They are for war. They fight and each one tries to kill as many on the other side as he can." The little girl was silent for awhile. Then she said "Do you know? I know something." "What is it you know?" she was asked. She replied, "Sometime they'll be a war and nobody will come."

## U.S. National Takes Bonds

Construction of Sam Barlow high school, construction and equipping of a library materials center at both Gresham and Centennial high schools and construction of a grandstand and installation of field lighting for the Centennial high school athletic field will be partially financed through proceeds of a \$1,395,000 bond issue sold to a group of investors headed by U. S. National Bank of Oregon.

Fred G. Johnson, senior vice president in charge of the bank's investment division, said that the district sold the issue, which matures from 1969 to 1983, at a net effective interest cost of 4.78 per cent. This issue was the final one to be sold of the \$3,895,000 bonds authorized by voters of the district.

### Christmas Rally Set By Youth for Christ

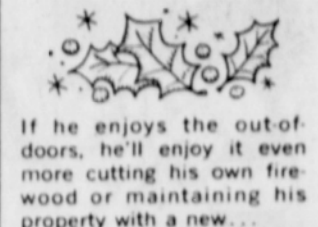
The Portland Youth For Christ's Christmas Rally this Saturday, Dec. 23, will feature the film production on the "Life of Christ".
