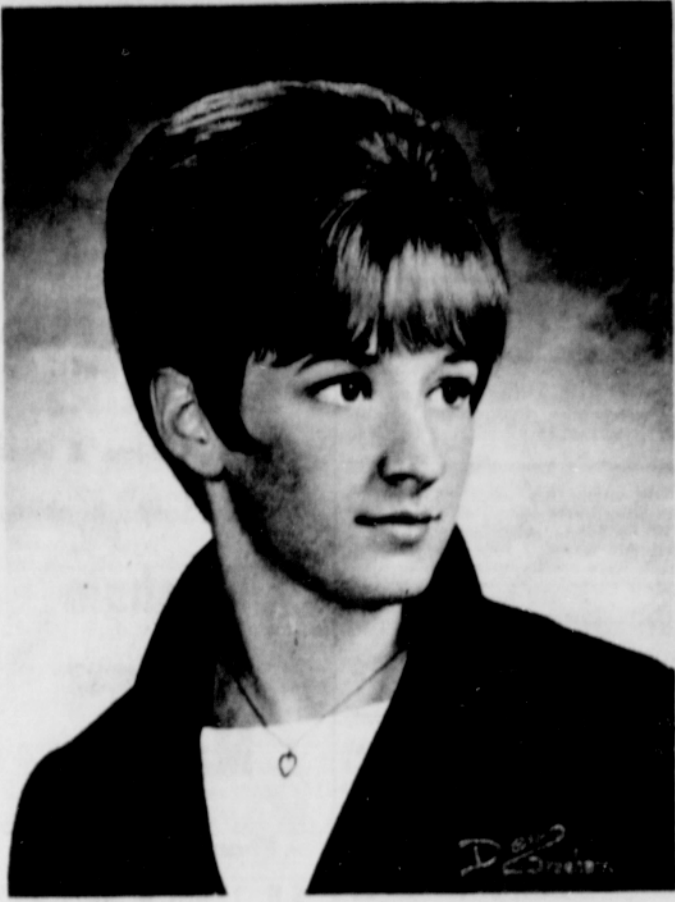

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Pioneer Days

Reading over some old letters the other day dated in 1914 and written to my mother while attending the Oregon College of Education, I came across such gems as these.

I had just received a new hat from a mail order house, "The National." Is that still in business?

Quote, "The hat was impossible. It looks like a postage stamp on my head (Those were the days of yard (almost) across hats) I do my hair in a Psyche knot now so the combination is more immense than ever. I, also sent back the long white gloves and I was tempted to send back the vivid green petticoat but they are quite fashionable so I will keep it."

Then the letter goes on to describe some dance costumes, really shocking.

"I wish you could have seen some of the girl's dresses. One had a yellow crepe silk skirt, very thin and under it she had on white silk knickers and you could actually see her corsets, legs, etc. The waist was entirely of lace and she might just as well have had nothing on. Our Gym teacher was dressed the same way and the pianist had a slit X-ray skirt and the slit showed her legs up to her knee and she had on lace, ruffled pantslets. Of course that was just a few. Most of the girls are decent."

More descriptions of costumes.

"Miss Parrot is a perfectly wonderful teacher but she is so cross, but no wonder, she lives on tea and coffee. She has some swell new clothes and our matron, Miss Todd has, too. She has a black satin suit draped with an enormous bustle and tight jacket. Her hat is trimmed with what looks like a butcher knife."

It was known that Miss Todd had a part ownership in an exclusive dress shop in the east and that's where her creations came from.

"I had to decorate tables for St. Patrick's Day dinner. Our center pieces were hollowed out large potatoes and we filled them with shamrocks. One of the girls and I made a huge Irishman to pin a pipe to (while blindfolded). He was about four feet high and the worse shape as I made his head and Gussie made his feet and he didn't make connections very well."

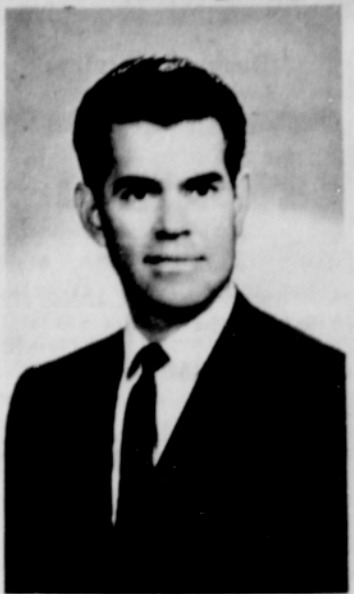
Pastor Installs New Officers
