The Oregon Primary

Sometimes, it isn't much fun being a Republican in Oregon . . . all the action is on the other side.

But this time, the Republicans can sit back and smirk; the GOP presidential primary here May 28 could do much toward naming the next president.

The Federal Land Bank Association of Oregon City has declared a \$9,777.15 dividend, which will go to its 581 member farmers and ranchers in this area, according to FLBA Manager Leighton G. Perkins.

The figures represent the association's share of a \$1,290,825 dividend declared by the Federal Land Bank of Spokane which makes loans through the local association.

The FLBA of Oregon City and the 60 other FLBA's in the four northwest states own all of the Spokane bank's capital stock. ***

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

To the Editor:

In March of 1966 most of rural Clackamas County was Interim Zoned by order of our three-man Board of County Commissioners. There was no formal comprehensive plan. They, by their own admission, ordered interim zoning to hold us in check until they could plan the area properly. There was no liaison with the people in the area affected. The way nearly all the rural people became aware that they were zoned was by a small notice that was included with their property tax bills or by having a stop work order placed on the homes they were building.

To add to the confusion, we were then required to make numerous trips to the county seat for the privilege of requesting the necessary permits and paying the fees and/or fines levied. To make a bad situation worse the officials delegated to administer these zoning laws were dictatorial in demeanor and more often than not downright discourteous to the public they served.

As a result of all this, a small group of rural citizens decided to hold a public protest meeting. There was a standing room only audience of over 1,200 people with two of our County Commissioners in attendance. One Commissioner, after listening to the complaints of the people, got up and stated that he was sick and tired of listening to a bunch of rabble rousing people.

Subsequent to this and other public meetings, it was decided that the rural people should band together and form an organization. This was done and

the group was named Zoning Adjustment Modification Organization (ZAMO). It's a grass-roots, nonpartisan corporation with this avowed belief: That whenever laws and/or legislation are passed that affect our homes and families, our lands or our way of life, we the people in the area affected should have a vote on it. We are sanctioned in this stand by the Grange, Farm Bureau, tax saver groups, labor unions and other civic organizations.

The State Statute that gives county governing bodies the almost unlimited authority in regards zoning is the much amended Oregon Revised Statute 215. This law in its original form was a good and acceptable law with provisions that the people would have the final say by way of our traditional ballot box. But due to changes and revisions instituted by lobby and pressure groups it, in the words of one of our State Legislators, "No longer represents the original intent."

At the last State Legislature our organization introduced Senate Bill 485 which in essence would have returned O.R.S. 215 to its original context. We won the Senate but due to pressure applied from County Commissioners or their representatives, County Planning Groups and their lawyers and paid lobbyists we lost the House. In the final analysis, we did win a token concession, but lost the main ruling we were after that the Statute should contain provisions that the people in the area affected have a vote.

The one big battle we feel we did win, though is right over night. We are guaranteed

our right to true representative government by our National and State constitutions. We still have government of the people by the people and for the people.

If you feel your individual rights are being violated by your County Government and if you feel, as we do, about the inequities of our present zoning laws we would certainly like to hear from you and most earnestly solicit your support.
