Note to Peggy and Gene Bowman: Bet the next time you come to dinner at my house you'll wear hiking boots!

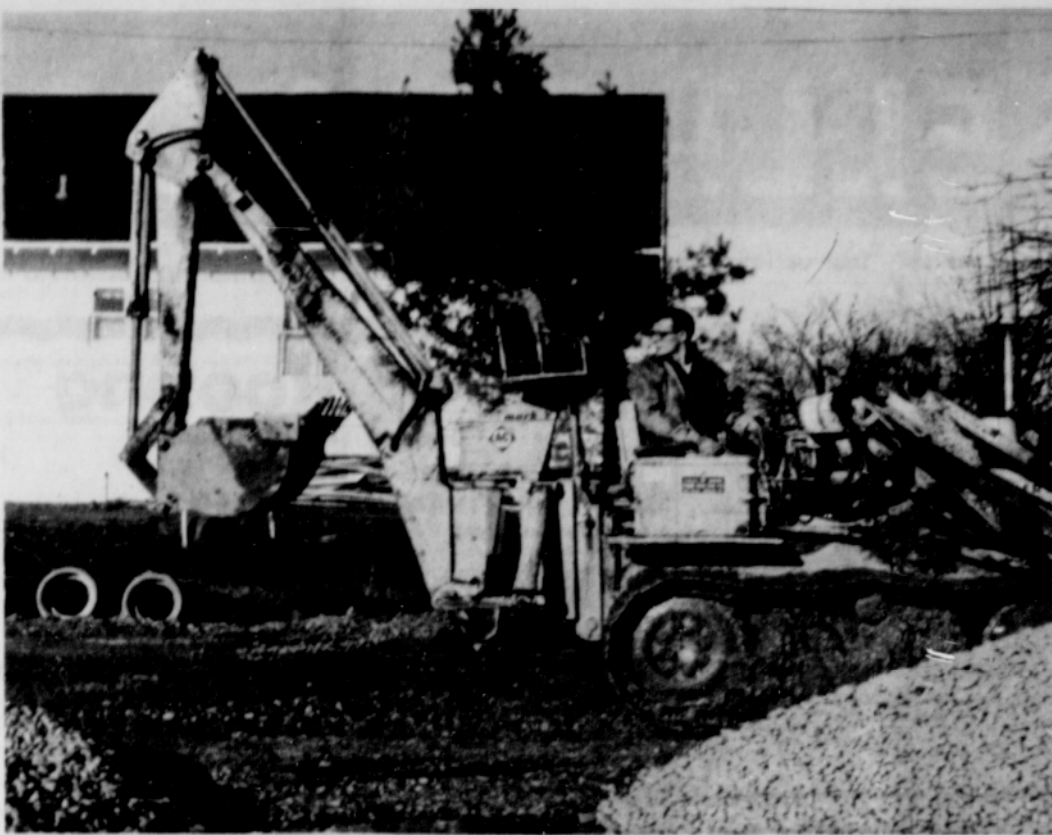
