Barlow Trail Threatened

Whenever relocation and improvement of an old road is at issue, it is practically certain that some compromises will have to be made through cooperative efforts of land owners and government—and just as certain that not all concerned will be happy with the results.

Property owners along Hoodland's Truman Road have been waiting since the 1964 flood to have their road restored and, since this project has been under recent consideration, have proven themselves more than cooperative and open to reasonable compromise with the County Road Dept.

It was expected that the department, cooperating in turn, would recognize the rights and desires of adjacent property owners, and—up to a point—it seemed this was true.

Unfortunately, arbitrary recommendations made in a Feb. 9 report

by the Board of County Road Viewers, indicate that no real consideration has been given in this respect, little or none to preservation of the road's natural beauty, and none at all to the fact that Truman Road, as it existed before the '64 flood, was an important part of the original and historic Barlow Trail.

We hope that when this "Viewers" report is read by the County Commissioners Wednesday (Feb. 21), short-sighted road maintenance considerations will be disregarded, not merely in fairness to concerned property owners but in recognition of their important obligation to preserve and safeguard this memorable path of the pioneers.

The outcome of the Truman Road project will be watched with interest by all persons interested in protection of the cultural heritage of Clackamas County.

New City Hall Need

That Sandy must soon have a new City Hall is a fact known to all but the most recent arrivals in the city.

Plans for such a building have been accepted by the City Council.

Sandy voters will soon be asked to approve or disapprove these plans—probably in the coming primary elections.

We urge every Sandy voter to at-

tend the meeting to be held in the old grade school gym Monday night for the purpose of explaining the plans and their financing to the public.

Attend, listen, ask questions, learn the importance of the issues involved—and there are quite a few. Only then will you be prepared to make an intelligent decision when the time comes.

IT'S YOUR LAW

"I'M NO COUNTERFEITER!"

Charlie was dumfounded the day a Secret Service agent visited his store and told him, "That advertising handbill you distributed yesterday violated the law concerning the photographing of money."

"I took that picture myself," Charlie admitted. "I was just trying to show you can 'save a dollar at Charlie's when you buy your next bag of fertilizer.' How did that picture of the dollar do any harm? I'm no counterfeiter!"

The agent explained that U.S. or foreign money, checks, bonds or other obligations can be photographed only for news-worthy, educational, historical or numismatic (currency collection) purposes. "You can't photograph it for advertising purposes," the agent said.

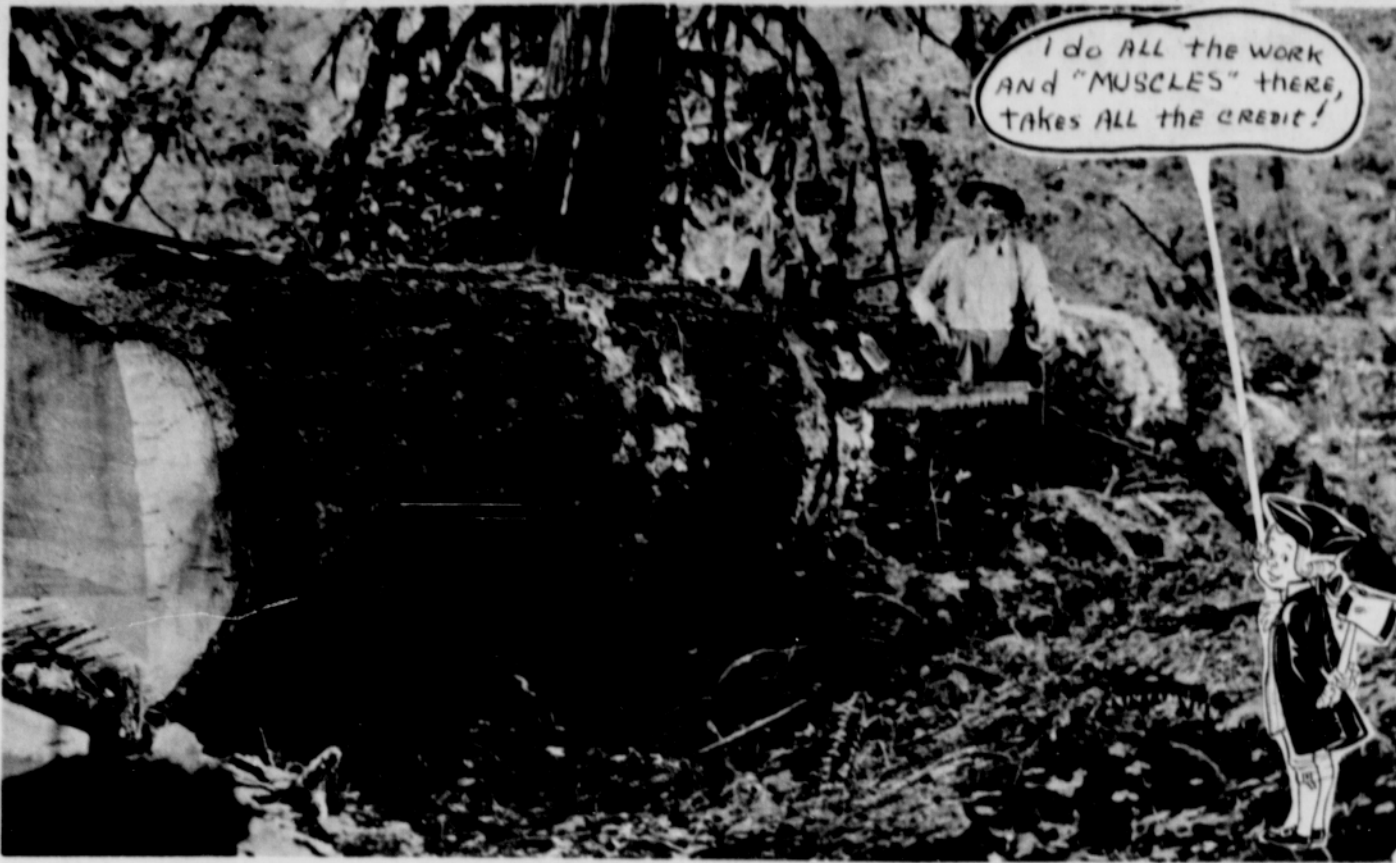
"It was a coincidence, I hope," he continued, "that the money was actual size. The legal reproductions I just mentioned must be a specific size either larger or smaller. Who printed this for you, anyway? He should have known better--and using green ink, too."

With a sheepish look, Charlie replied, "I printed it. I've got an old press in the basement I use for my advertising stuff. Print it for a couple of other stores, too."

"Well, you'd better check the laws regarding this before you do any more," the agent said. "You could be liable for a penalty of \$5,000 fine or 15 years in prison or both for violation of these laws. Next time to be safe, use 'stage' money like they do in the movies. It may look real, but it isn't."

Fortunately for Charlie, he got off the hook with a reprimand from the court, but he was very, very careful what he did with his camera in the future.

GERALD GOFF, Captain USAF, recently arrived for duty in Vietnam and has been assigned to the Fifth Air Commando Squadron at Bien Hoa Air Base as a U-10 pilot. The squadron is the first unit in Air Force history whose mission is devoted entirely to psychological warfare. Flying C-47's and U-10's from three different operating locations, 5th ACS crews drop leaflets and broadcast loudspeaker messages encouraging the Viet Cong to give up their fighting and return to the open arms of the Vietnamese government. Captain Goff, a 1955 Sandy High School graduate, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Goff of Sandy.

Vets' Loans Reach Near Record

The State Department of Veterans' Affairs had its second highest year in dollar volume of loans in 1967, as 4,244 veterans borrowed \$54,369,050 to acquire their own homes and farms, H. C. Saalfeld, director, reported today. Only the record year 1961 was higher when 5,944 loans were granted for \$62,859,550.

Last year's loan volume was awfully close to that of 1966, when 4,254 loans were granted for \$51,885,950.

In Clackamas county last year, loans were granted to 465 veterans in the amount of \$6,084,150, compared to 461 loans in 1966 for \$5,841,600. Since the start of the program in 1945, loans have gone to 5,254 veterans here in the amount of \$52,005,825.

The 1967 statewide figures bring the totals for the program since its beginning to 60,519 loans in the amount of \$561,338,324. Saalfeld said that of this amount, veterans have repaid more than \$290 million in principal and \$98 million in interest. They are repaying at the rate of nearly \$4 million a month, with interest payments alone averaging more than \$1

million.

The veterans' repayment record continues to be excellent, according to Saalfeld. The rate of serious delinquencies is

slightly over three delinquent accounts for every 1,000 loans outstanding, and foreclosures number less than seven for every 1,000 loans granted.

The program has earned more than \$23 million in profits in its 23 years of operation, with last year's earnings,

amounting to \$2.9 million. These earnings have been re-loaned, thus reducing the amount of bonds that have to be sold to obtain financing.

POPE'S FUND SIZABLE

Peter's Pence is the name of a special fund collected each year on St. Peter's Feast Day, June 29, in Catholic churches throughout the world. The fund, which is estimated to amount to several million dollars a year is distributed by the Pope to his favorite charities.

Detectives Check Youth's Death

Multnomah County Sheriff's detectives are still investigating the death of Michael Schlosser, 17, 2011 SE 170th Ave. An autopsy revealed that the youth had died of a traumatic head injury.

Schlosser was taken to the hospital Feb. 11 when a friend, with whom he was staying failed to awaken him. He died in the hospital following head surgery.

The county coroner Dr. William Brady said the youth died of a skull fracture and brain hemorrhage. He said the death could have been caused by a fall or a blow on the head.
