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Yes, for the City Hall . . .

Ballot Measure No. 58 on the primary ballot is of concern only to the voters of the City of Sandy. It proposes a bond measure of \$151,000.00 to finance the construction of a City Hall and Library.

The Presidency

In the Republican presidential primary, we recommend Richard Nixon. On the Democratic side, Eugene McCarthy.

On the GOP ballot, Nixon is clearly superior to California Gov. Ronald Reagan. Nixon's supporters have worked hard for their man here, hoping for a substantial victory. They should get it.

Most of the interest, obviously, has been on the Democratic side where McCarthy and Robert Kennedy have campaigned strenuously and where the Lyndon Johnson-Hubert Humphrey vote can't be overlooked.

Oregon's primary may be crucial. McCarthy must win or face elimination as a serious contender. Kennedy needs an impressive vote here to keep up his momentum en route to the California primary.

Both men — especially Kennedy — have brought in extensive, expensive

campaign organizations. McCarthy has strong support among intellectuals, the liberals, amongst college students. Kennedy also is strong with the young voters and with minority groups although these will be nowhere as important here as in other states. Labor is largely anti-Kennedy, pro-Johnson but isn't outwardly campaigning for anyone.

We like McCarthy for a number of reasons, but basically because of his honesty, his forthrightness, his willingness to discuss the issues, his dedication to ending the war in Vietnam and to getting America off the sickening slide of the Johnson years.

His victory in New Hampshire, accomplished even though the professionals said it "couldn't be done", made a contest out of the 1968 race. It broke the campaign wide open.

We think he can do the same thing here, despite the well-oiled, well-heeled Kennedy steam-roller.

Miscellany

This is an extremely long ballot and not to be forgotten are such items as tax base requests for Mt. Hood Community College, races for delegates to the national convention etc.

Betty Schedeen of Gresham is seeking a post as national committee-woman for the Democratic party and certainly merits local support. A num-

ber of other local people also are involved in delegate races.

The Mt. Hood tax base request is \$875,000 and would eliminate the necessity of the college going to the voters each spring for its budget. In view of the assured growth of the college, the figure is reasonable. We think it should be approved.

Over All, Viet-Nam

Finally, we don't think anyone can go to the polls this time without being influenced by the war in Viet-Nam. Something must be done to end the unconscionable conflict there, before a whole generation of our fin-

est young men are wiped out . . . and a struggling new country along with it.

We urge the support of any candidate who has the courage to speak out on Viet-Nam.

Sport Fishing Inequities . . .

Democratic systems of government are supposed to give protection to the rights of minority as well as majority groups. But in what sort of democratic system can granting special privileges to certain select minorities be justified?

For two successive springs, Commercial fishermen on the Columbia River have been just such a privileged minority.

In late April the Columbia was closed to all salmon fishing, Sport and Commercial. Because of the small escapement of Spring Chinook over Bonneville and other upriver dams, this was deemed necessary by the states of Oregon, Washington, and Idaho.

On May 10, even though the Game and Fish biologists of the two states felt the escapement was still insufficient, the Washington and Oregon Fish Commissions decided to open the gill-net season on May 13.

Washington's Game Commission then opened Sport fishing on Sunday, May 12. However, Oregon's Game Commission did not allow Oregon's Sport fishermen on the river until the following Tuesday, May 14. This time difference gave Commercial fishermen 24 hours in which to strip the cream of the run from the river before Sport fishing could start.

This delay, a familiar and repeated pattern from previous years, spawns

the question, "Is the Oregon State Game Commission subservient to the Fish Commission?" If not, then why this one or two-day delay each year?

This delay is especially odious to Sport fishermen in that it privileges a minority, the Commercial Fishery, and virtually subsidizes the industry through the powerful tool of the Oregon State Fish Commission . . . at least that is the impression one gets when reviewing the actions of the Commission.

The State Fish Commission not only draws over a million dollars each year from your tax dollars in the General Fund, but takes, as well, half the Game Commission's revenue from Salmon and Steelhead tags, which is totally derived from sportsmen's dollars.

We believe anadromous fish of the Northwest should no longer be viewed as an exploitable resource to be commercialized for the benefit of a few. Rather should they be regarded as a natural wildlife resource to be enjoyed by all within a framework of controls that insure perpetuation.

The Oregon State Game Commission should be the guardian of such controls, but its effectiveness seems to be subject to the whims of the Fish Commission. Existing inequities should not be allowed to repeat themselves.

Your nine Sandy Volunteer Fire Dept. Auxiliary members

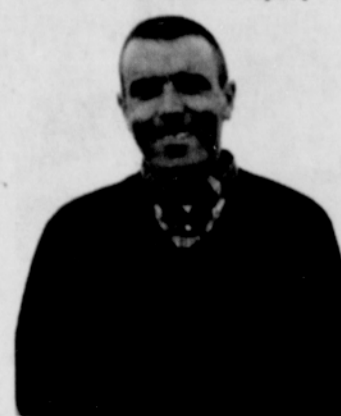
were proud to be able to present Fire Chief Lyle Seaman and the firemen of Fire District #72 with the new lightweight resuscitator for the ambulance.
