Jim Martin cut down Gresham one-hit Monday night burling the league leading Sandy Giants, past the Gophers, 1-0 for their second straight victory.

Martin now 2-0 struck out ten and walked three, and allowed only one Gopher to get past second base. Jay Massith opened the fourth with a walk and took third on a throwing error, he then was safe at the plate on Martin's wild pitch, but later after a heated argument, the run was disallowed, because the hitter David Sinclair had not reported to the Umpire that he was in the game, although he had pitched the inning before.

The only run of the game came in the second inning after Mike Hite, who was apparently thrown out shortstop to first base, was given a reprieve because the plate umpire had not said "batter up."

Hite then walked on four straight pitches, stole second, went to third on a wild pitch, and then two outs later scored on a wild pitch.

Tom Wilcox got the only hit of the game off Martin, a single just by shortstops Larry Moody's glove in the second inning.

The only run off Martin was unearned as, with two out in the sixth inning, Bill Dudley walked and scored when right-fielder Steve Truesdale muffed an easy chance on a fly-ball off the bat of Larry Fuller, for a two-base error.

Martin was supported by a seven-hit attack with Mike Hite and Martin getting two apiece.

The Pioneers picked up a single run in the second inning on Martin's single, and later on Roger Williams' single-an infield out.

Sandy then scored four big runs in the fourth to jump into a 5-0 lead as Leon Verdoorn was safe on an error, Martin grounded out and Verdoorn moved up to second. Hite then singled, scoring Verdoorn, Williams was safe on an error, and an out later Rob(Bird)Bignall singled to drive in two more runs.

Three more Sandy runs were pushed across in the fifth as Verdoorn walked, Martin singled, and both moved up on a wild pitch. Hite drove them both home with a single, then scored on Truesdale's ground-out.

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**Pioneer Days**

Recently, Librarian, Eunice Barnum, called my attention to the book, Oregon Poets, edited by the House of Henry Harrison Poetry Publishers, Sixth Ave, N.Y. She said I would find some contributions from Sandy Poets.

So I wasn't surprised when I read five very charming poems by Emma Bennett Miller but in Sandy we always called her Mrs. J.M. Miller. When I first knew her, she and her husband lived on a farm in Sandy Ridge. A sister-in-law, Ivy Varetti, boarded with them while she was teaching the Sandy Ridge School. So we saw the Millers often. I think Mrs. Miller was rather lonely on the farm as before they the farm they lived in town. I believe Mr. Miller had been a teacher. However she beautifully overcame her loneliness at least outwardly but in one of her lovely poems, Illusions, I think she expressed some of her feelings.

Another poem, The Empty Room, may have referred to her only son who was killed in eastern Oregon in a clash between the cattlemen and sheep men. A lovely poem is Spring Waking, a description of what she felt when springtime came.

Mrs. Miller, also wrote news for the local papers as well as for Portland papers. I remember her saying, "I am so crazy to write but just haven't the time to do as much as I would like." I heard she was working on a rather long epic. I don't know whether she ever finished it or not.

Another contributor to "Oregon Poets" is Mira Ann Hornecker. Mrs. Hornecker, whose maiden name was Flynn, was an indomitable lady whose interests were extensive. She was a friend to anyone in need until she became bedfast a number of years before her death. In the book she has three rather long poems.

Mrs. Hornecker's parents, and other relatives are buried in the long neglected Cherryville Cemetery. It seems sad that many of these old burial

places are allowed to become desolated and overgrown with weeds and brush and so it seems to the Mountain Grange. Their project this year is to restore this one particular burial place. The new road has bypassed it so a new one will have to be built and in the cemetery, itself, tons of the blue flowered myrtle will have to be removed by hand, as no powers tools can be used until some order is restored.

At the May meeting of the Mountain Grange held in the old Brightwood School House, Grant DeShazer gave an excellent talk on the plans for this project.

When I lived in Cherryville, we had several memorial services in this old cemetery. A vivid memory, too, in the indignation of the neighborhood when the farm adjoining the cemetery was sold and the new owner found through a survey that part of his land was in the cemetery. Despite the pleas and offers of money from the relatives of those buried on his property, he insisted that the graves be removed.

A number of old families are represented in the cemetery, Wares, Odells, Shanks, and Friels, to name but a few but it is thought there is a record of the graves in Oregon City. This project will be expensive so any contribute will be welcome in money as well as in labor.

**HEAVY WOOL SKI-TYPE sweaters** should be washed by hand in lukewarm water, with a mild soap. Squeeze water through the fabric. Rinse in water of the same temperature. Bulky knits soak up lots of water. To speed drying after hand washing, put the sweater in the washer, add a bath towel to balance the load, then set the dial on "spin". Let the machine run for one minute. Remove the garment, dry on a flat surface after patting it back to its original size.
