Recreation Report

MT. HOOD NATIONAL FOREST
COLLOWASH RANGER DIST.

1. Most roads are open. Heavy log haul continues over the Colowash River Road, the Thunder Road 5709, and the Bagby Road 570, from Thunder Rd. to the Colowash River Rd. There is also log hauling on the Round Lake Rd. 5760. Dust oil treatment has been completed on the gravelled portion of the lower Colowash River Road. Visitors will find patches of fresh oil for the first 4 miles. Dust oil treatment has been completed on the Bagby Road 570 from the junction with the Colowash Road to the junction with the Thunder Road. Dust oil treatment will continue on the upper portion of the Bagby Road this week and visitors will find patches of fresh oil on the road.

2. The following trails are open and maintained: Pansy Basin, Round Lake, and Alder Flat. A new trail was recently constructed into Round Lake and is in excellent condition. The starting point for this trail is the first parking area north of Round Lake. The trail to Bagby Hot Springs is in excellent condition, but not maintained above Bagby Hot Springs. Elk Lake Trail and Fish Creek Mtn. are open but not maintained. Bull-of-the-Woods Trail still has snow at the higher elevations.

3. All campgrounds are open. Charge campgrounds on the district are Ripplebrook and Kingfisher. Other campgrounds available for use are Pegleg Falls, Cripple Creek, Little Fan Creek, and Alder Flat. Special Feature attached.

4. Fishing improved in the Colowash River and several anglers reported improved success over the past week. Fishing continued slow at the higher lakes. A few fish were being taken at Round Lake.

5. Warming weather will increase fire danger. Visitors are cautioned to be careful with their campfires and to make use of developed fireplaces at the campground areas.

6. The rhododendron is now putting on a magnificent display of color in the higher patch cutting areas. At the higher elevations bare grass adds its color to that of the rhododendron. Visitors wishing to find areas suitable for photographing are advised to travel the Round Lake Road 5760 and the Farm Creek Road 5708.

SPECIAL FEATURE: We have decided to feature one of our campgrounds in each of the next few recreation reports. The Ripplebrook Campground will be the feature campground for this report.

Ripplebrook Campground contains 14 automobile units. It is easily accessible and is located on Highway 224 adjacent to the Oak Grove Fork of the Clackamas River. The campground is approximately 1/2 miles east of the Ripplebrook Ranger Station. Campground Roads and unit parking areas are paved. Visitors can fish in the Oak Grove Fork. The campground is ideal for a weekend camping trip and provides ready access to both the Clackamas and Colowash River drainages.

A new library for Sandy is a reality for the fall of 1969 according to plans of the City Council.
