Mrs. Ida B. Reinholdt of Rt. 1 Sandy, has recently returned from Guadalajara, Mex. where she attended the graduation of her son, Darel Courser, from the Medical University Autonoma De Guadalajara.

Dr. Courser's home is at Cherryville and he is a former student of the Sandy schools. His wife, Effie Bruce Courser, spent her school days in Sandy also; she is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clair Bruce, who lived many years on Bluff road.

The Coursers have three children, Cheryl 15, Randy 13 and Connie 9.

Dr. Courser headed a medical clinic at Granja, short distance from Guadalajara, before his graduation. A new clinic building is under construction, near the old building where approximately 4000 patients have been treated each year.

Dr. Courser and family spent some years as missionaries in Nigeria, Africa before he studied medicine, and he observes that the medical need is almost as great in Mexico as in Africa. Mrs. Courser has been teaching in the American grade school of Guadalajara while her husband pursued his medical course.

Dr. Courser will be interning in Houston, Tex., and his future plans are to be a medical missionary in a foreign land.

Sandy Student Chosen For Math Training

A Sandy youth is one of 40 high school students from 19 states who have been named to participate in a National Science Foundation Secondary Science Training program in Mathematics June 24-Aug. 9 on the University of Illinois Urbana campus.

Michael Van Lindsey, Rt. 2, a Sandy high school student, has been selected.

Participants were chosen on the basis of mathematical ability and achievement, motivation, and evidence of creativeness, according to Prof. John E. Wetzel, U. of I. department of mathematics at Urbana, who is program director.

The program, now in its fourth summer, is designed to identify and encourage students having unusual ability in mathematics. This year's program will conclude with a prize competition.

"By challenging each student to work to the limit of his ability, the program will stimulate his intellectual curiosity, strengthen his mathematical intuition, sharpen his scientific insight, and strongly accelerate his overall mathematical development," Wetzel explained.

Participants will study courses on number theory, geometric transformation and problems-solving in courses taught by U. of I. faculty members. A few students having unusually strong backgrounds will be assigned as tutorial students to senior staff members for directed individual study.

Federal Grant Awarded MHC For Building

Mt. Hood Community College Tuesday was awarded a \$466,306 building grant as partial funding for an academic center on the college south campus.

The grant was announced by MHC President Earl Klappstein after official word was received from the Washington, D. C. offices of Sen. Mark Hatfield and Rep. Edith Green.

The grant, awarded by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare Office of Education, was allowed under Title I of the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963. It is part of a total \$5.3 million funding for the building. Other monies have been appropriated from the State of Oregon and Multnomah County.

The building, designed by Springfield architects Lutes and Amundson, will be advertised for bids later this year. Projected completion date is 1970.

The center will include academic and vocational education classrooms. It will be built in a series of phases.

Area Students Earn Top Grades

Local area students are included on the spring term honor roll announced by Oregon State University.

To be eligible for the honor roll, students must have had a B plus or better grade average for the term.

Honor roll students include: Carl E. Amstad, senior in pharmacy, and Steve Sakauye, senior in engineering, both from Boring and Philip D. Miller, junior in science from Estacada. Miller was a straight-A student for the term.

A breakdown of the honor roll showed 169 on the straight-A list and 938 the B plus or better list.

Serve Salad Supper For Summer Days

CHEF'S SALAD

1 head lettuce
1/2 bunch romaine or endive
1/2 cup chopped green onions
1/2 cup sliced celery
1 cup julienne strips cooked meat (beef, ham, tongue)
1 cup strips cooked chicken or turkey
1 cup julienne strips Swiss cheese
1 can (2 ounces) fillets of anchovies, if desired
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup French dressing
Ripe olives
2 hard-cooked eggs, sliced
Tomato wedges

Have all ingredients chilled. Tear head lettuce and romaine into bite-size pieces; toss with onion, celery, meat, chicken, cheese, anchovies, reserving a few strips of meat and cheese. Just before serving, blend mayonnaise and French dressing; toss salad. Top with meat and cheese strips, ripe olives, egg slices and tomato wedges. 4 servings.

On Honor Roll

Boring, Estacada and Sandy students were named to the spring term honor roll at Oregon College of Education in Monmouth.

Twenty-one students earned perfect 4-point grade averages and another 182 were on the honor roll with 3.5 or better.

Column Comments

The first vegetables canned commercially in Oregon occurred in Clackamas County. The Lovejoy Cannery located at Oregon City processed a small quantity of snap beans nearly 50 years before any of Oregon's famous Blue Lake beans ever went to a cannery. Although Clackamas County doesn't currently have any bean processors located in the county, we have over 1,000 acres of snap beans grown for processing plants located in other counties.

One of the remarkable success stories of the Willamette Valley is that of the Blue Lake pole bean. The late J. O. Holt of Eugene Fruit Growers Association in 1923 secured Blue Lake bean seed from California and planted it in Eugene, Oregon. The actual story of the Blue Lake began in California where the bean originated in the Blue Lake region of Lake County, California. There it was canned commercially about 30 years before the initial planting in Oregon in 1923.

Like most new crops it was some years before the Blue Lake bean was planted extensively in Oregon. Although the end of the pole bean era has been predicted many times, the Blue Lake pole beans continue to remain important in Oregon's economy and it appears will be so for a number of years.

Blue Lake pole beans are recognized as the peer of the green beans and its quality has eclipsed all other green beans in the United States. Oregon's cool nights and long, sunny days have produced a quality bean unsurpassed in any other part of the country. The Blue Lake bean is popular from the canning standpoint for several reasons. It lends itself to easy processing and has a remarkable ability to withstand the punishment of the steam table in hotels and restaurants and not become mushy or colorless.
