A THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

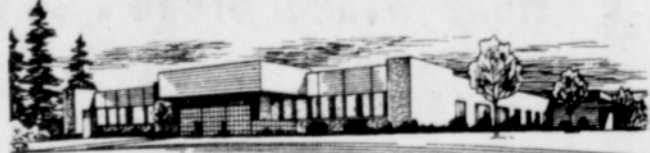

Did you ever wonder how the Christian flag, seen in churches, had its origin? A speaker engaged for a "rally service" in the Brighton Chapel in Coney Island, N.Y., failed to appear on time on Sept. 26, 1897. Mr. Charles C. Overton, superintendent of the church school, substituted for the speaker and unexplainably began to talk about the American flag. Suddenly, he envisioned a flag for the church, a flag unrestricted by geographical or creedal boundaries, a flag to remind all people of their allegiance to God. Extentaneously, on the spur of the moment, he described a Christian flag as he envisioned it. He pictured a field of white, signifying purity, innocence and peace; in the corner a union of deep blue for a symbol of faith, trust and sincerity—with a Latin cross emblazoned in red.

The following Sunday, the Christian flag was draped for the first time in the chancel of the Brighton Chapel. It was made by Mr. Annin, a flag manufacturer who did much to secure its adoption by churches. Its use spread rapidly throughout the U.S. and today it is seen throughout the world. Watch for next week's column which will relate how the pledge of allegiance to the Christian flag originated.

MUST CHILDREN FEAR A HOSPITAL STAY?

To answer this question, let's look at what often makes youngsters afraid of hospitals. For years, the institutional atmosphere of white walls; starched, efficient and busy nurses; impersonal machinery; and the sudden disappearance of parents has been a frightening experience for children undergoing hospital care and treatment for anything from the common tonsils removal to unplanned emergency care.

WHAT CAN BE DONE TO CHANGE
THE ATMOSPHERE?

Well, no one enjoys being sick. However, the Pediatrics Department atmosphere can be changed to make the stay as cheery as possible. The brand new 16-bed Pediatrics Department at Woodland Park Hospital is a good example of a new psychology in hospital care for children. Here's what has been done:

- The walls are color-coordinated.
- Furnishings are homey - not institutional.
- Each room has a television set.
- The floors are entirely carpeted.
- Nurses wear colorful floral print smocks.
- There is a playroom for children well enough to be out of bed or crib.
- Visiting hours have been relaxed and, in some cases, the physician may allow parents to stay overnight with their child.
- The Pediatrics Department is separated from the rest of the hospital.

WHAT ELSE IS NEW IN PEDIATRICS?

Modern electronic equipment has enabled provision of more efficient and economical care of the youngster.

At Woodland Park Hospital:

- The nurse can electronically read the child's temperature from the corridor.
- A remote-control hypothermia blanket can lower the child's temperature.
- Individual room temperature can be controlled according to the doctor's prescription.
- Where necessary, electrocardiograms may be taken without the nurse having to enter the room.

In general, parents can help hospital staffs alleviate the fear children have of hospitals. Children should be exposed to hospitals, whenever possible, before the need for hospitalization. They should be encouraged through their schools, youth organizations, or individually by their parents to visit the hospital to form positive impressions.

Childbirth Course

A five-week course to help prepare expectant parents for the experience of childbirth will begin July 16 at 7:30 p.m. at Woodland Park Hospital, 10300 N. E. Hancock, in cooperation with the Childbirth Education Assn. of Portland.

The two-hour classes, administered by CEAP and instructed by a registered nurse, will acquaint soon-to-be parents with the mechanisms of pregnancy, labor, and birth, and instruct in a variety of exercises to assist in relaxation and control.

The curriculum, developed by the New York Maternity Center, also includes information on all

major medical approaches to childbirth.

Enrollment will be limited to provide individual attention for all participants. The class is expected to be as interesting to husbands as wives.

Mr. and Mrs. Dean Gisvold, 284-3885, are handling the registration. A physician's written permission will be required for participation in the exercise program.

CEAP is a group of professional and lay persons concerned that the Portland area have an adequate program of childbirth education. The group has been largely responsible for the six-year childbirth education program at the YWCA.
