Sandy BPW Club President Has Outstanding Record

Outstanding club woman and teacher, Sandy's BPW Club president Mrs. Edward M. (Florence) Schmitz, has been honored numerous times by the business, professional and church groups to which she belongs. What makes her different? Her history and record reveal the answers.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Max Kligel of Sandy, she began her teaching career in eastern Oregon in 1930 at the Center Ridge School near Dufur. The building still stands but has not been in use since consolidation with Boyd schools.

That was a winter of heavy snow and the temperature dipped to 22 degrees below zero but schools then did not close simply because of the weather. Florence's transportation was not a heated school bus, but a gentle, light plow horse which she rode three miles to school each day.

During Christmas vacation her gentle horse died and she had to ride a nervous young pony. One day a rattling teaspoon in the lunch pail excited the pony and he ran all the way to school. There was no need to open the gate en route as he jumped right over it. That afternoon the brave young schoolmarm mounted the pony for her return to the home where she boarded. Thereafter the pony gave her no more trouble. He knew who was boss.

One year of this rugged life was enough. Her next teaching station was at Dickey Prairie School, out of Molalla, where she spent two years.

In 1933, Miss Florence Josepha Kligel, was married to the Edward M. Schmitz, who is so well remembered for his ability as a baseball player. She and Ed used to hike the trails from Jonsrud Park (now filled with new homes along Jonsrud Lane and Bluff Road) down to the Sandy River.

Their son, Alfred D. Schmitz, was born in 1936. Alfred and his family now live in Gresham and he is employed at Richardson's Chevrolet Garage.

For nine years after marriage Florence did not teach but devoted most of her time to her family, church and club work.

In the middle of the school year in 1942 a second teacher was needed at Sandy Ridge School and she returned to the classroom. Later she taught at Kelso School, and since in 1946 Kelso and Sandy Ridge Schools consolidated with Sandy schools Mrs. Schmitz has taught 22 years in the Sandy school system.

During this time she taught the third and fourth grades one year, the fourth grade for two years and the fifth grade for 19 years.

A child is lucky to be assigned to her classroom. Other than pure book learning she instills many character-building traits such as independence, loyalty,

dependability, pride and thriftiness. She encourages her students to buy savings stamps and cash them into savings bonds to be held to maturity.

Each Wednesday during the school year she spends part of her free period making a trip to the post office to get stamps to be pasted into savings bond books.

She reads the classic fairy tales to her students, also selected portions of Uncle Tom's Cabin as she feels this book helps them to understand the Civil War.

A highlight for her students each year is the making of ceramic gifts for their parents at Christmastime and on Mother's Day. Mrs. Schmitz personally fires and handles each piece carefully. Mothers cherish these gifts for a lifetime.

She attended Oregon State College and received her Bachelor of Science Degree from Oregon College of Education at Monmouth.

Mrs. Schmitz has been President of the Sandy Elementary Teachers' Association. She has been secretary and president of her church group, the St. Michael's Women's Club, and teaches a class at her church on each Saturday throughout the school year.

In club work she has been District Director of the North Willamette District of the Oregon Business and Professional Women's Club for two years. She has just completed one year as State Public Relations Officer and was reappointed for the 1968-69 term. She has also served on the State Nominating Committee.

In the Sandy BPW club she has been elected president five

times and represents it at state conventions.

She has attended its national conventions in San Francisco in 1958, Los Angeles in 1962, and plans to attend the 50th Anniversary Convention in St. Louis in 1969.

Her hobbies are ceramics, working in her flower, vegetable and berry gardens, and being a pal to her daughter-in-law, Carol, and grand-son, two-year old Matthew Schmitz, better known to her friends as little "Matt".

The pledge of allegiance to the Christian flag (and did you know there is such a pledge?) is patterned on the pledge to the Stars and Stripes. The pledge to the Christian flag was first recited on Christmas Eve, 1908—11 years after the adoption of the flag. It occurred in the Third Methodist Episcopal Church, Long Island City, N.Y., during the pastorate of Reverend Mr. Lynn Hough.

A Mr. Ralph Diffendorfer was conducting a conference of Sunday School workers in Brooklyn when the Rev. Mr. Hough suggested that a pledge of allegiance be prepared for use in saluting the Christian flag. Mr. Diffendorfer was impressed with the thought and asked the Rev. Mr. Hough to prepare an appropriate pledge. Before the conference ended, the pledge was prepared.

"I pledge allegiance to my flag, and to the Savior for whose Kingdom it stands; one brotherhood, uniting all mankind in service and love."

The pledge to the Christian flag and the pledge to the Stars and Stripes are closely linked in words—and purpose.

CAN YOU EXPLAIN WHAT AN INTENSIVE CARE UNIT IS?

Chances are that unless you or a member of your family has ever been critically injured or ill, you would have to answer "no."

Generally, however, the Woodland Park Hospital Intensive Care Unit is just what it sounds like. It is a special area where all functions are solely geared to give maximum care in a minimum time. ICU care is ordered by a person's private physician.

In the Woodland Park Intensive Care Unit,

- There are heart monitors giving constant evaluation of heart activity.
- There are electronic pulse and temperature recorders.
- There is an immediate supply of oxygen from built-in wall units.
- There is a wide range of emergency drugs immediately available.

Made possible through advances in modern hospital technology, the ICU is highly efficient. It utilizes efficiently the short supply of highly-trained professional nurses, and answers the need for economy in an era of spiraling hospital costs.

STAFF - ICU is staffed 'round the clock by two nurses. All patients are kept under constant supervision from a central nursing station.

COST - Because of the costly precision equipment and constant nursing attention, ICU service costs a little more. It is considerably cheaper than a private room with three private duty nurse shifts.

LENGTH OF STAY - This is entirely up to the progress of the individual. Of course, his physician will move him to a regular room as soon as his condition permits.
