Miss Juanita Joyce Belcher of Kirkland, Wash., died July 21, as a result of injuries suffered in a July 13 traffic accident near Boring.

SOME RANDOM OBSERVATIONS

Some fish behavior patterns occur from most primitive forms. Sharks, which are a prehistoric holdover of a very primitive class of fishes, are famous for their feeding orgies which wind up with them eating each other and sometimes even tearing chunks out of themselves. Do trout ever behave this way?

Observing commercial hatchery raised trout in a private pond being fed, led to these observations. Throw a few pellets near a solitary trout and he would rise slowly and take one. After a while, he'd take another, but all the while he was very lackadaisical about it. Throwing more pellets in near him attracted a few other trout from a nearby area. They took a few pellets slowly at first and then all at once they all started feeding competitively and became practically frenzied as each tried to down as many pellets as fast as he could.

This frenzied feeding was accompanied by furious darting about trying to run the others out while trying to feed at the same time. The big difference between the trout and the sharks was that at no time did even the largest trout in the group attempt to actually grab any of the other trout.

This competitive feeding frenzy can be activated in these hatchery reared fish time and again. But given only one or two trout in an area it doesn't develop.

In this same private pond are a number of native cutthroats from the stream that feeds the pond. They feed on the pelletized trout feed also, but with a difference. The rainbow will swim around just beneath the surface and gulp down pellets as fast as they locate them. Where pellets are thick on the water surface they move around the surface just like a porpoise.

Not so with the cutthroats; they rise from the bottom, take a pellet in slashing turn, and dart back to the bottom. They repeat this complete round trip for each pellet taken.

Before the pond blossomed with algae, you could see quite well clear to the bottom with polaroid glasses. When not feeding, the cutthroats always held to the bottom eight inches of depth. The rainbows, unless molested or threatened by shadows or splashes, cruised slowly around in the top half of the water depth. There was an area between the two species in the deeper water that was unoccupied.

From a vantage point in an overhanging tree, the fish life of a typical pool in the Sandy River was spread out below like a picture. At the head of the pool a fast tongue of broken water where the main current entered arrowed into the pool for a considerable distance. Moving in and out of the edges of this current tongue were a number of young steelhead and salmon yearlings of 6 to 8 inches in length, slim, light
