Has the word "Temptation" gone out of style?

Members of the Sandy Seventh-day Adventist Church sought to find out in a special study by adult members last Saturday morning. The subject was studied in the church's nine adult classes, using the Bible as the basis of consideration.

Charles Ward, church Sabbath School director, in announcing the study said, "One of the most interesting aspects of this study is the error that many persons make in thinking that God brings trials and temptations to man. Students of the Bible have a clear answer to this misconception.

"With the concept of 'situational ethics' gaining ground in today's world, it would seem

to many that temptation, and its end product, sin, are going out of style. But human concepts have never yet changed divine laws.

"The future of America depends upon the answer that her people give to the problem of temptation," stated Ward. "Unless the moral fabric of our society survives, our nation will crumble."

"Teenagers are people who express a burning desire to be different by dressing alike." A phone call last Sunday morning from Lena Bickford (formerly Thomas) now living in Toledo, Washington, took me back in time to Sandy's colorful history. Mrs. Bickford is a Sandy pioneer and a Sandy Post reader, and had been interested in my recent mention of the old Revenue family cemetery. She recalled "Grandpa" (Francis) Revenue's funeral in 1909. He was 95 years of age at his death. This cemetery was on the Revenue property. Mrs. August

(Myra) Hornecker is buried beside her husband who died in 1956 at the age of 87 years of age. Mrs. Hornecker's first husband was Ed Revenue. Mrs. Bickford said it was likely Mrs. Hornecker is buried between her two husbands, and that possibly the marker on Ed Revenue's grave is missing. It was a pioneer custom (if one had two spouses during a lifetime because of the early death of one) to be buried between them.

Ed and Myra (later Hornecker) Revenue's daughter was Ruth Revenue, who married Harry Reed. Mary E. Reed, who died in 1930 at the age of 86 years, is believed to be Harry Reed's mother.

The first person believed to be buried in the Revenue family cemetery was Mary Revenue McGugin, (Mrs. Bickford's mother's stepfather's first wife) who died about 1873. Following the death of his wife, Mr. McGugin married Mrs. Bickford's grandmother, who was then a widow. They had twin sons, who died at birth, and are buried in this cemetery. Once upon a time a board fence surrounded the twins graves.

Mrs. Bickford also related other Sandy historic memories: The Old Dew Drop Inn at the site of the present TJs Restaurant, used to be the John Revenue Hotel. The old Junker home was directly across the street from the Hotel. Bina Perrett, her sister-in-law and Mrs. Bickford's mother-in-law used to work together at the Hotel and they jokingly referred to it as "The Thomas Matrimonial Bureau" or some similar name.

Mrs. Bickford's husband, John Bickford, had the first garage in Sandy. Her grandfather came across with the Barlow Train when he was 19 years old. He and three other boys helped drive over Mt. Hood. He once showed her where they had roped the wagons down the side of Devil's Backbone and the bark of the trees is chewed off where the ropes were used. He also helped cut the road to Summit.

She also mentioned the old log school-house, which was across from the Revenue family cemetery, where there used to be a large cedar tree. Since last Sunday was the day the annual Pioneer Assoc. Picnic, she recalled the first Pioneer Picnic when class reunion was held of those who had attended this log schoolhouse. She believes the first pioneer reunion was in 1928 when her grandmother McGugin was Queen. In 1935 at the Pioneer Association reunion, she showed slides and the secretary that year had an old newspaper showing what is believed to be one of the few pictures taken of the schoolhouse.

Mrs. Bickford's brother, George Thomas, lives at Alder Creek. One sunny weekend soon, I hope to make a trip to see Mrs. Lena Bickford at Toledo, as I would like to meet the person behind the pleasant voice

that considers "long-distance calls her gas mileage". Health reasons confine her to her home and writing is difficult for her, but I know she has more interesting information on Sandy history and I am looking forward to meeting her.

It was great to see my friend, Dave Ludi, in Sandy again after two years in Peace Corps work in Ethiopia! He signed up for another year with Peace Corps and will return to teach in the same school. More on David's experiences at a later time.

In last Monday's mail, I received a lovely letter from Mrs. Virginia (Morris) Bridgman, of Route 1 Box 1211, Hood River 97031, who is a Sandy Post reader. Here are excerpts: "My brother, Duane Morris, graduated with the Class of 1960 and still lives in the Sandy area. He has kept in contact with several of his class and school mates. I married the night after graduation in 1956, and after living in Sandy for three years, we moved to The Dalles. After 4 years, we tired of the hot, dry, windy summers and moved to Hood River Valley. Here my husband, Jack, manages 126 acres of orchard. We are also raising four lively children, a boy and three girls; all of whom will be students this fall at a beautiful small country school. They will all attend Wyeast High School. If our son should play football, I feel I'll find myself rooting for both teams! I sincerely wish our class (1956) would have a reunion. I wonder about so many of them."
